Dump trout in Rockwood

The Grand River Conservation Authority is using rainbow trout to lure fishermen into Rockwood Conservation Area this year as well as other parks.

By April 24, the opening date of the trout fishing season, 3,300 eight to 10 inch trout will have been dumped into five authority reservoirs or ponds. Last year authority waters were stocked with about 2,000 trout, half of them rainbow and half speckled. The most ambitious stocking program is aimed at the Conestogo reservoir near Elmira



Other population studies are also planned for the reservoir above the main dam at Rockwood. Once again, depending on study results, the Rockwood reservoir could be drained, coarse fish removed and sport fish added for the 1972 fishing

Information gained from lingered. population studies enables Mr. Oldfield to decide what stocking should be done in an area.

A population study is made using a boat equipped with a fish shocking unit. The unit sends out electrical impulses which attract then stun the fish. They are picked up, studied, tagged and returned to the water. The fish revive after a few minutes and are none the worse for the experience. Mr. Oldfield's dream is to

eventually get sport fish back into the main river.
