# \$1,131 grant for arena

Tree planting begins next week in the area under the jurisdiction of the Credit Valley Conservation Authority. Superintendent Norman J. McMahon reports that more than 150,000 trees will be planted this year by Authority staff. The type of tree, white pine, red pine, white spruce, silver maple — depends on the land to be planted. Prior investigations are made to determine the physical qualities of the land to include drainage problems, hillside or swampy areas. Many of the trees are planted with the Authority machine planters but in rough areas or on steep hills hand-planting is necessary. During the past 10 years the Credit Valley Conservation Authority has planted about three million trees of various kinds on public and private lands in the Credit River Watershed.

A cheque amounting to \$1,131 is being forwarded to Erin township treasurer Bert Berry. The money is a provincial grant towards the Hillsburgh community centre arena and hall. M.P.P. John Root advised the Free Press this week.
