



M. Z. Bennett triple trio festival winners Ask zoning to allow restaurant and motel

Application for the ultimate commercial zoning of land on the corner of Highway 7 and the Fifth line, east of Acton, was made by lawyer Ken Langdon at Esqueusing Council's regular meeting, Monday, April 20.

Representing Horst Baron, owner of the land, Mr. Langdon told council plans call for establishment of a farm

equipment sales and service business, service station and eventually a farmer's market, restaurant and motel on the property, presently used for farming.

Mr. Langdon claimed the Fifth Line is perhaps the busiest crossroad between Acton and Georgetown, excepting the Seventh Line. He suggested the

property is in an ideal site to serve transients, especially since a provincial highway passes directly in front. He also pointed out there is already some industrial use of land on the Fifth Line, south towards Limehouse.

Of the approximately 1,000 feet frontage on Highway 7, necessary for construction of the business, 270 feet would be used for the farmers' market, 200 for the service station, 4 feet for the equipment sales and retail outlet and 125 feet for the restaurant.
