Deputy Reeve of Nassagaweya Don McMillan is still concerned about "the hosing Nassagaweya is getting in education taxes." At the Monday night meeting of Nassagaweya Township, Council members agreed with McMillan's suggestion that actual facts and figures be compiled to show how the township is being severely hurt.

McMillan said Halton County Board of Education Superintendent of Business Bruce Lindley felt the township had a case if they objected to the provincial equalization factor. McMillan said he thought Lindley or a board representative would support the township's stand if they made an appeal to the Department of Education.

McMillan said the answers given were feasible by calculations at the Board level but the fact remained the township ratepayer is getting "hosed".

## Councillors doubt value dump site

The waste management branch of the Department of Energy and Resources Management has approved in principle the proposal to use an abandoned pit on the property of Milton Brick as a sanitary land fill site for garbage from Milton, Nassagaweya and Esquesing.

Reeve Tom Hill and Councillor Len Cox commented on the proposal at Monday night's meeting of Esquesing Council with Hill stating any engineering done at the site should be at the expense of Milton Brick.

However, final approval cannot be granted until engineering plans are submitted and accepted by the department.

"I don't think it will be much good to us down in that corner," the reeve remarked in obvious reference to the location of the site in the southwest corner of the township.

"I think it's a backwards step to bring garbage from another municipality and dump it in ours," Councillor Cox commented.
