## Moffat squirts maintain Tri-County league lead

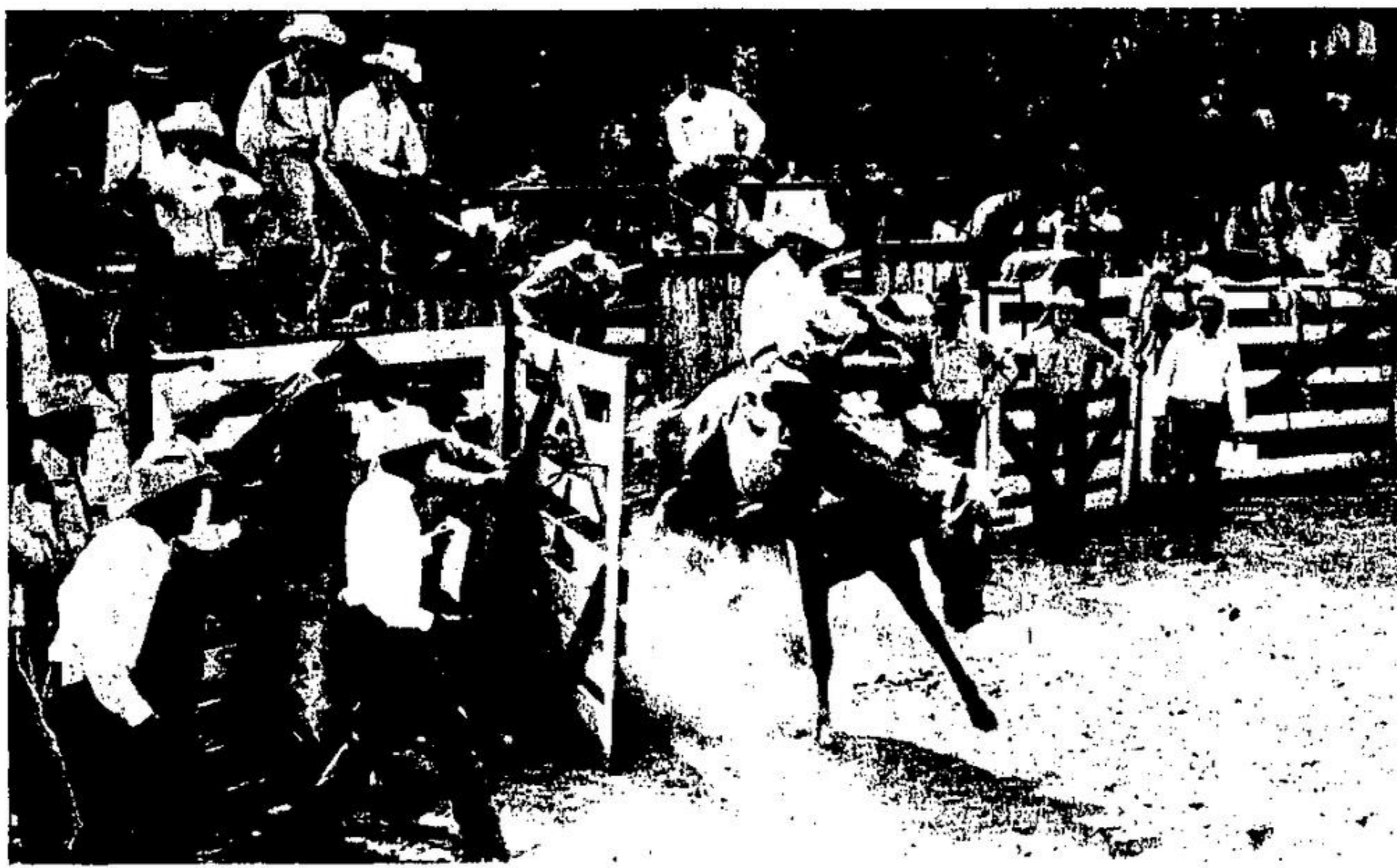
Moffat squirts scored two decisive wins last week, to maintain their hold on first place in the Tri-County Minor Softball Association.

## Sportsmen's Show

# Allow free use of park board will run booths

Acton Sportsmen's Show Association will be granted free use of Prospect Park and the community centre for their annual sportsmen's show, Friday, Saturday and Sunday September 4, 5 and 6.

Acton Parks and Recreation Committee agreed Thursday night not to charge a fee for park rental, as they did last year, but decided to operate all booths and food concessions for the three day event. The committee already operates the booth in the community centre.

Representing the Sportsmen's Show Association, Alan Eastwood and Morris Staley asked the committee to consider one of two proposals.

First proposal was to charge the association a fee for use of the park, then allow them to rent out concessions to local restaurants and caterers. Second was to allow them free use of the park and community centre and have only recreation committee booths and concessions open.

Speaking on the first proposal, Mr. Eastwood said the association hoped to invite all local restaurants to set up booths at the

show, in an effort to encourage the catering industry in Acton. Mr. Staley pointed out his group would not be able to charge a reasonable rental fee for booth sites, if the arena booth were open and competing for business.

More effort Mr. Staley said a great deal more effort is being put into organization of this year's event and predicted if the committee chose to charge the group 5 per cent of the gate receipts, as they did last year, they would probably realize far more than the \$18 they recovered last year.

Mr. Eastwood said a crowd of between two and three thousand is expected to attend the three day event.

According to Mr. Eastwood, the Lions Club made a profit of \$135 on their booth last year. He said he thought concessions could be rented out for more than that this year. Caterers would only come to the event if they could make a profit. At the same time, he emphasized the importance of having as many local businessmen as possible participate.

"Fifty dollars here or there doesn't matter much, it's the participation that counts," he said.

In Mr. Staley's view, the good of any committee is the atmosphere it provides for private industry and commercial enterprise.

Regarding the second proposal, Mr. Eastwood reminded committee members they could make a lot of money from their own booth with such a large crowd.

Marks replies Although he made it clear he has nothing against private enterprise, Councillor Peter Marks said he would prefer to have the recreation committee operate food booths and allow the association free use of park facilities. Profits from the arena booth go back into the community as well, Councillor Marks explained.

"If we close our booth, we're closing about \$800," he reminded his colleagues. Arena manager Harold Townsley estimated the arena booth grossed \$600 during last year's show.

"I quite agree, let's give them the facilities," chairman Hugh Patterson commented. Permission to have a helicopter land in Prospect Park was also granted the association, providing they comply with Department of Transport regulations. The Association is to be responsible for cleaning up the park following the show.

Among the 20 events Mr. Eastwood promised for the three day show, are a casting derby, trap shooting, and model boat competition, put on by the Metro Marine Modellers Club who attended last year's show.

Five local service clubs have donated \$25 each to providing operating capital for the show, he said.

## Proceed with arena repairs

Renovations to the east wall of the Acton arena will probably begin this week.

Repairs to the wall are stage two in a renovation program which began last spring, following an engineering study on the structural adequacy of the building. The south wall was shored up last year.

Accept quote Acton Parks and Recreation Committee accepted the quote of Dalton Engineering to proceed with renovations to the east wall, at their regular monthly meeting Thursday night. The Dalton quote was \$10,500, which property chairman Orval Chapman pointed out is an upset price.

Councillor Chapman reported repairs will be carried out in stages according to priorities suggested by the firm and that the committee will be kept up to date weekly on costs of the work.

Can save If enough money is available, work on the cross-bracing will also be done. Councillor Chapman estimated the committee could save about \$700 by having parks employees help with work.

The committee decided to have only most necessary work done, when Acton council lopped \$5,000 off the \$13,000 figure, originally set down for arena repairs in the parks and recreation budget.

## Should move swings

Complaints about teenagers hanging around Glenlea Park until 11.30 at night, lodged by two Longfield Road residents John Kyrstein and Bill Allan, have prompted Acton Parks and Recreation Committee to consider moving swings in the park away from the backyards of homes on the street.

Mr. Kyrstein told the committee Thursday night, he had to move his swimming pool last year, because it was damaged by youths throwing debris. Broken glass was found at the bottom of the pool, Mr. Allan said.

Too close "The idea of the swings is good, it's just that they're so close to the property," Mr. Kyrstein explained. He made it clear he was not asking the committee to take the swings down permanently.

Councillor Peter Marks assured the two men the swings were installed in their present location strictly on a trial basis.

Suggests relocation "We didn't think we'd have this problem, maybe we could canvass the neighbors to get their opinions on where they should be," he suggested. Councillor Marks thought perhaps the ball diamond in the park should be relocated as well.

Chairman Hugh Patterson thanked the men for making the committee aware of the problem.
