## Two propose overnight camps in Nassagaweya

Nassagaweya Council discussed two proposals to establish overnight trailer and tent parking for tourists within the township.

Conrad Sweet appeared before council and said he had been in touch with the Department of Tourism and they agreed there is a need for such a facility in the area. Both Mr. Sweet's property and Bert Day's, the second man making a similar proposal have property abutting Highway 401.

There is need

Mr. Day did not appear at the meeting but had been in touch with members of council and the clerk. Mr. Sweet said the need was there and it could tie in with

the recreational plans for the township.

He said representatives from the Department of Tourism were going to visit him this week and after looking at his 62 acre farm would suggest layouts for the development. He noted there were no facilities of this nature in this area.

Make them farmers?

Councillor Cal McIntyre insisted the approval couldn't be given without zoning change. Councillor Jim Watson suggested the zoning by-law was too restrictive and quipped that both men might supply each tent or trailer with a plot of land and a hoe to avoid the zoning change.

## Busy week

An Acton man was charged with driving while his license was under suspension last week. Another local man was charged with impaired driving. A liquor seizure and a disturbance at the Station Hotel were also reported by police during an unusually busy week.

Council agreed to instruct both applicants to pursue their plans and get approval from the necessary bodies including the health unit before coming back to council for final approval.

## ESQUESING COUNCIL BRIEFS

At their regular meeting Esquesing Council:

—Accepted the tender of Wheeler Haulage to move a pile of topsoil from property behind the township offices at a price of 70 cents per yard. Only other tender received was from Hillside Sand and Gravel, who offered to move the pile for \$150. Roads superintendent C. E. "Bud" Snow estimated the pile contains about 1,500 yards. One hundred and fifty yards will be taken from the pile and donated to the village of Glen Williams to help construct a cairn at the War Memorial there.

—Approved a \$150 grant to the Y.M.C.A. and Y.W.C.A. of Georgetown to be spent within Esquesing township as the two organizations see fit. The Y.M.C.A. plans to operate a day camp on the grounds of Limehouse school this summer.

—Agreed to provide snow fencing for the annual Hornby Garden Party and the annual grant to the Georgetown Agricultural Society. Spencer Wilson appeared before council with both requests.

—Received a copy of a permit the Halton County Health Unit issued to Blue Springs Ltd., R.R. 5 Milton, for dumping sludge. Dumping is to be restricted to the farm of I. Patterson.

—Received Department of Highways' approval for purchase of a new truck.

—Agreed to answer a letter from Glen Williams resident Patricia Herrington granting her permission to operate a hand-crafts shop. The township's holding by-law does not apply to the hamlets.

—Received a copy of a letter from township solicitor Terrance Baines to Harry Hooper, a resident of the Esquesing-Nassagaweya town line, informing him he must dispose of used vehicles on his property immediately.

—Received a copy of a letter from Mr. Baines to Andrew Varga, a resident of Highway 7 near Silvercreek, advising him he must cease operation of a shoe repair business at his home immediately.

—Received a complaint about the condition of Confederation Street in Glen Williams from L. Dearsley. Mr. Dearsley claimed his son had been hospitalized for two days after falling from his bicycle when he struck a large pothole in the road.

Reeve Tom Hill presided for the three hour meeting. Councillor Dick Howitt was absent. All other members were present.
