

Parks and rec. notes

At their regular meeting, Acton Parks and Recreation committee:

- Approved an amendment to a previous resolution regarding salary increases for employees. The amendment approved a \$6 per week increase for Don Price. The original resolution calling for a \$4 increase was in error.
- Agreed to send a \$300 deposit to FAB Maintenance of St. Jacobs to guarantee purchase of a new ice resurfacing machine for the community centre. The machine will be delivered in the fall.
- Approved purchase of a water softener for the arena booth at a cost not to exceed \$475.
- Approved a \$50 donation to the Acton Minor Soccer Association to be used to purchase equipment. A letter requesting financial aid and use of park facilities was received from the association.
- Received a letter from the Acton Minor Baseball Association requesting information on the use of the hardball and softball diamonds in Prospect Park. The letter was referred to arena manager Harold Townsley, who is looking after hours for use of park facilities.

St. Joseph's First Communion held for first time in afternoon

"Today you have the greatest gift that God would give us" Father Lloyd Ryan told a class of 16 children, who made their First Holy Communion at St. Joseph's Church, Sunday afternoon.

Father Ryan, pastor of Church of Our Lady, Guelph celebrated Mass and preached the sermon at the afternoon ceremony, a first for St. Joseph's. Previous First Communion Masses have been celebrated in the morning.

Also Pentecost Father Ryan reminded the group they were fortunate to be making their First Holy Communion on Pentecost Sunday, the anniversary of the day the Holy Spirit descended upon the Apostles in tongues of fire.

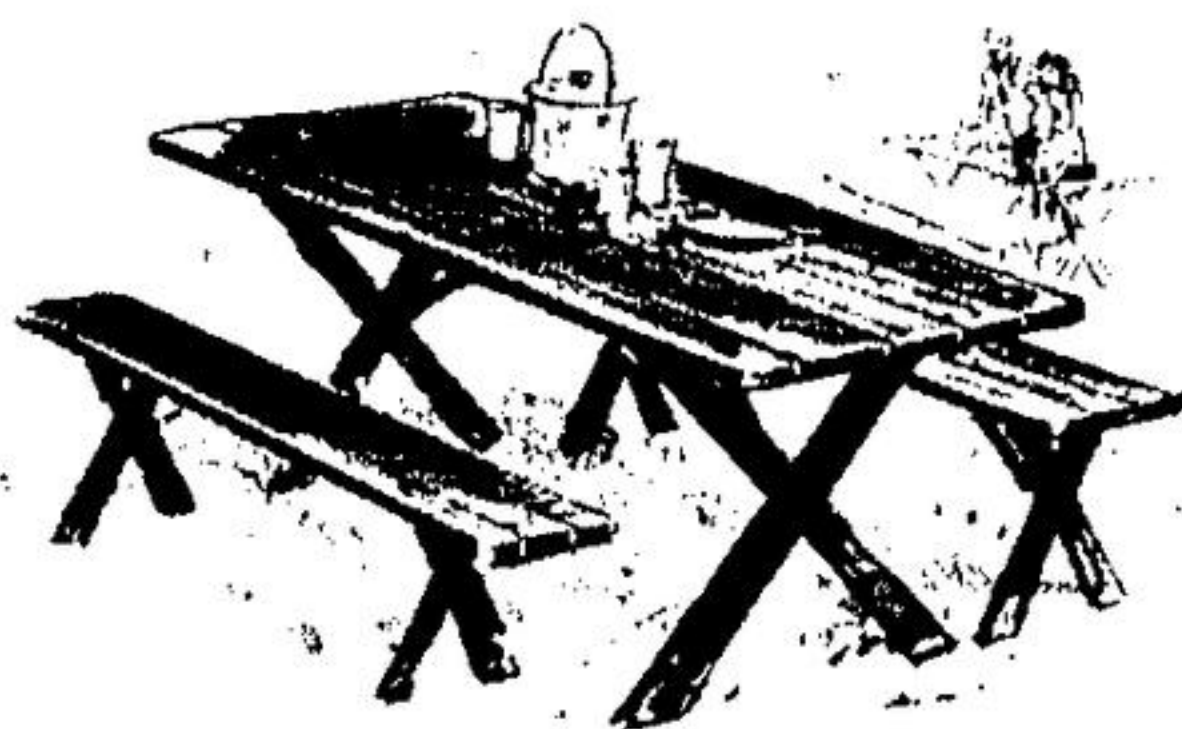

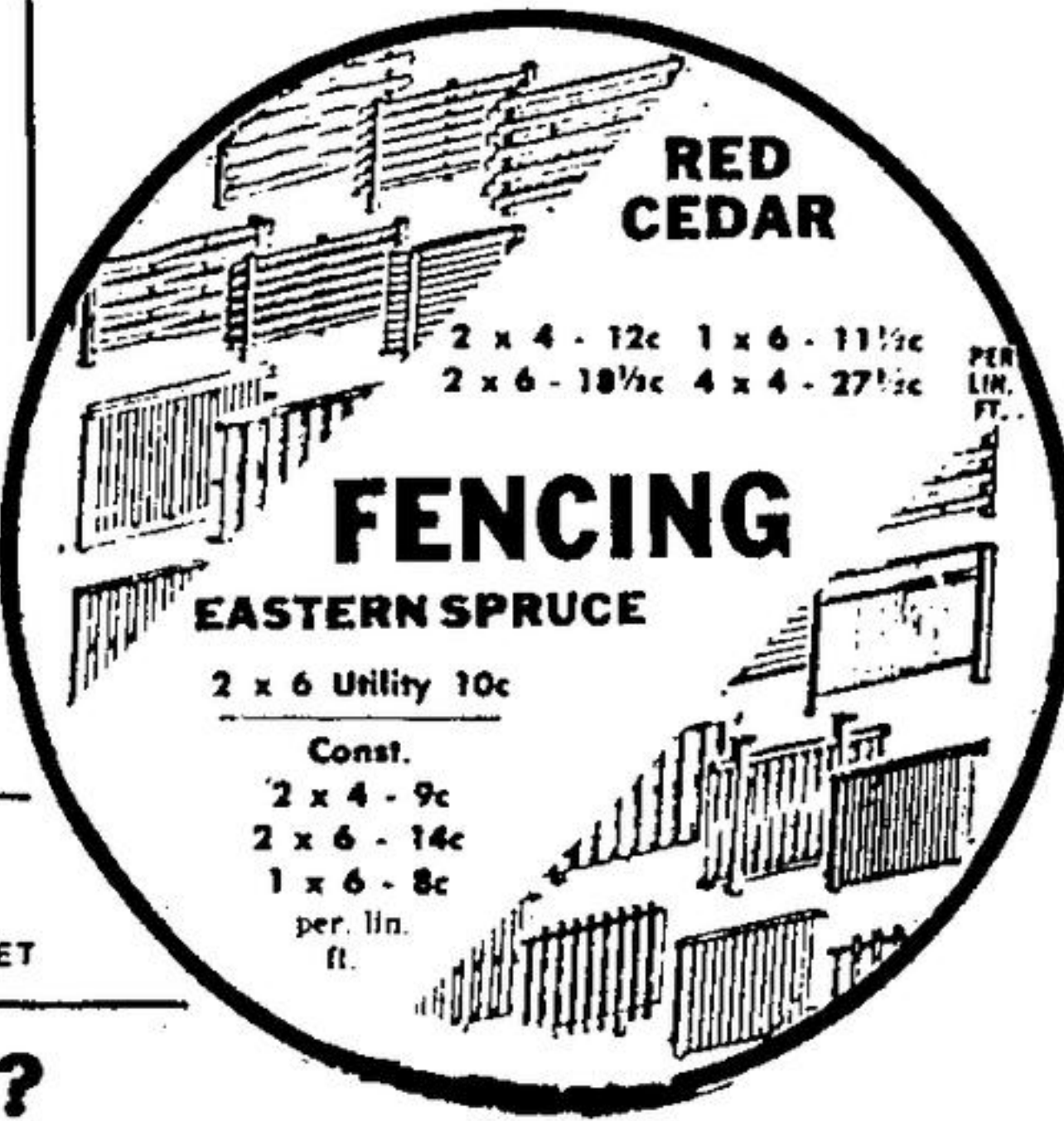
