## Rose pruning is very important

Properly pruned roses will produce attractive flowers and strong growth for several years. Although individual varieties differ in habit, shape, growth and culture, most are pruned in spring before bushes leaf out. Some climbing and rambling types are best pruned in September.

The first step is cutting out dead and weak canes, leaving three to five strong stems. The popular hybrid tea roses can be pruned back to within six inches of the ground, with two or more buds remaining on each stem. Floribundas are pruned similarly although not as severely.

Prune back

Vigorous growing perpetuals and grandiflora roses can be pruned back to about one foot from the ground. For larger bushes with more blooms, the stems should be left longer. For exhibition blooms, the bush should be cut back severely leaving one or two short stems. Climbers and ramblers flower

on the former season's growth. In early fall, old canes and leaves should be removed and three to five strong stems left.
