

Who will care for Hornby cemetery

Esqueing Council is looking for some organization interested in taking care of or renovating an abandoned cemetery at the corner of the Eighth Line and Steeles Ave., near Hornby.

Last week, council received a letter from the Department of Financial and Commercial Affairs informing them the cemetery is in a state of abandonment and that the responsibility for its restoration rests with the municipality.

Councillor Len Cox reminded his colleagues organizations have often taken over the care and renovation of cemeteries in the past.

Creditable job

"At Ashgrove, the scouts and Women's Institute did more than a creditable job," he said. "Maybe if we approach somebody in the Hornby area, they'd be interested in doing it," Councillor Cox suggested.

Reeve Tom Hill said council would be willing to give grant to help an organization take care of the cemetery. Council gave \$200 towards restoration of a pioneer cemetery at the corner of the Fifth Line and Highway 7, near Acton.

Council decided to ask Canon Maxwell of Hornby to mention the matter at church.

Hope to narrow issues at second hearing

Esqueing Council has authorized its solicitor Terrance Baines to launch a motion for directions to the OMB and to call such witnesses as are deemed necessary, when the second OMB hearing on the township's controversial holding by-law convenes in the council chamber Monday, June 21.

A solicitor, thought if the OMB were to give some direction on what evidence they want to hear, it would narrow the issues down.
