Rams record first win

Acton Rams finally "put it all together", when they walloped Windsor Michigan-Ontario Juniors 20-4, for their first win of the season in Amherstburg Saturday night.

On offence, Rams were never sharper, as they recorded a new team single game scoring mark. Nine different players scored and the referees disallowed four other goals, claiming Acton players were in the crease when they shot.

Defence good

Defensively, in the words of team president Howard Dwyer, "they couldn't have been better." Goalie Gary Turkosz held Windsor to single tallies in each of the first two periods. Coach Bruce Sears inserted Bruce Murray with Rams leading 15-2 at the 11 minute mark of the third period and the rookie netminder made a successful debut, allowing only two goals over the final nine minutes.

Mike Marcoux fired five goals to earn game scoring honors. Bob Andrews and Bob Turkosz rattled in four each. George McPhail bagged a brace and Mike Cooper, Chris Sargent, Bob Gowland, Harry Barens and Alan McKenzie netted a goal apiece.

Playmakers

Turkosz was top playmaker with five assists. McPhail earned three, Andrews, McKenzie, Gowland, Mike Cooper and Paul Cooper contributed two each. Single assists went to Bob Roughley, Fred Barens, Stu McCulloch and Doug Hons.

Windsor goals were scored by Shaperio, Suszek, Coughlin and Dagleman.

Rams took 15 of the game's 26 penalties. Chief culprit was Fred Barens, who sat out five minors and a misconduct and ended up with a game misconduct in the third period.

Rams drop quitter's tag battle Brampton to wire

Acton Ram's 12-11 loss to Brampton Excelsiors, in their home opener Thursday night, proved at least two important points. First, 60 minutes, not 15 make a lacrosse game. But second and most important, it proved Rams are not the third period quitters they were in their first four games.

For the first 45 minutes of Thursday's game, Excelsiors gave Rams a crash course in the fundamentals of lacrosse. When Brian Davey made the score 11-4 at the 3:17 mark of the third period, anyone would have bet the classy Brampton squad would increase the 14 goal margin by which they beat Rams in Brampton.

Up to that point, Rams didn't even belong on the same floor. While Excelsiors scored almost at will, Rams' power play floundered and every time goalie Gary Turkosz tried a long breakaway pass, Davey was there with his tremendous reach to intercept.

Tide turns

Then all of a sudden the tide turned. Excelsiors ran into a rash of penalties and Rams showed they had learned their lesson well, as they brought the partisan crowd to their feet with an exciting rally. They peppered shots at Brampton goalie Nels Tillander from all over the floor and connected on six of them, within a space of four minutes to make the score 11-10.

Bob Turkosz started it all with his third goal of the night at 5:51. George McPhail's first goal of the season at 19:33 offset a Brampton marker by speedy Ian Robinson at 10:28 and cut the Excelsior lead to 12-11.

With only seconds remaining in the game, Turkosz was bowled over at centre and awarded the ball. His blistering drive from 50 feet out beat Tillander, seconds after the final buzzer sounded, and left the locals one goal short of sending the game into overtime.

It was a heartbreaking ending to one of Turkosz's most brilliant efforts. Bob was in on all but one

of the Acton goals. He scored five and set up five others.

Mike bags three

Mike Marcoux broke a personal scoring slump with three goals, two of them in the six goal rally. George McPhail, Craig Weldon and Bob Waller netted the other Acton goals. Bob Gowland earned three assists, Gary Turkosz two and Weldon, Waller and Alan McKenzie one apiece.

For Brampton, Ian Robinson and Rick Sibley fired hat tricks. Brian Davey scored two goals and Mark McCauley, Pete Whaley, Joe Medeiros and Lloyd Gray added one apiece. Team captain Jim Brewster failed to score, but picked up three assists and was a solid two away performer.

The teams were tied 2-2 at the end of the first period. Excelsiors controlled play in the second period, outscoring Rams 6-2. Referees Ron Lamb and Mel
