Limehouse, Glen teams get \$500 in grants

Minor Softball teams in Limehouse and Glen Williams will split \$500 in grants from Esqueving township as a result of a decision by the township council Monday night.

The Glen, with 125 players signed to play ball, will receive \$300 of the amount, while Limehouse teams, with approximately 90 players, will get \$200.

Council deliberated for almost half an hour before deciding on the amount and how it should be divided. Councillor Len Coxie felt council should make a decision that night since the season had already started but cautiously observed council should try to keep within the same amount each year, no matter what the demand.

Only subsidy
Councillor Dick Howitt observed people should be made aware that the money was a

subsidy to keep ball flourishing and that the township was not financing it.

Deputy Reeve Russ Miller said the amount could be reviewed each year. Last year's grants were limited to \$50 for each championship team but Miller observed that it costs just as much to run any other ball team as 'it does to operate' a championship club and a system of awarding grants on a per capita basis would be more equitable.

Reeve Tom Hill said the size of the grants may make the township a target for more requests from other areas next year but most councillors felt grants could be controlled by setting an amount aside and dividing it evenly according to the number of teams and players. It was pointed out also that some players from Limehouse were playing in the Glen this year since one team had been cut at Limehouse.

Corp. Campbell moves to city

Letters complain of Int. dragway

Two letters complaining about operations at the Toronto International Dragway were read at Esqueving township council Monday night.

The first, from Mrs. M. J. Tizzard, a resident of the Town Line Erin township, said the air and noise pollution from the strip, situated between the Fifth and Sixth Lines in the north end of the township, had been unbearable June 5.

Mrs. Tizzard said her father, visiting them for the first time, was bothered by the noise and attendant pollution which were not good for his heart trouble.

The second letter was from consistent critic Charles Hildebrandt, Eighth Line North, who claimed the township's licence granted to the dragway was a contravention of the Agricultural Holding By-law which is presently in the process of being heard by the O.M.B. He asked the township to withhold the licence until the by-law issue is settled.

Council instructed the clerk to reply to both letters informing the writers the dragway was operating under a licence and abiding by regulations laid down and further council action could not be taken.
