Praise for the play of Acton Rams captain Bob Turkosz continues to pour forth from visiting Junior "B" coaches, none of whom has found a way to curtail him on his current scoring rampage. Brampton coach Clark Lyons and Niagara Warrior mentor Pete Conradi, both of whom have some pretty fair talent on their own squads, are the latest to shake their heads in wonder at "Turk's" tricky ball handling.

Unluckiest person in the county this week could be Oakville Peaks' goalie Grant Bryck, who'll have to face "Turk" and his teammates, here tomorrow (Thurs.) night. So far this week, Peaks have given up 51 goals in two games. Red-hot Kitchener braves topped them off 21-15 Monday night and Niagara Warriors humiliated them 30-9 in Oakville, last night (Tuesday).

Peaks will be the second of three teams Rams will have been fortunate enough to catch on the rebound from a tough game with the classy Warriors.
