Bullough captures second Open title

Jim Bullough fired a four over par 76 (38-38), to win the Acton Open Golf Tournament Saturday, for the second year in a row.

Bullough nosed out Rev. Andy McKenzie, a three time Acton Open champion, by three strokes to become the first golfer to win the J. Bert Wood Trophy two years in a row, since Mick Holmes turned the trick in 1958 and 1959. Rev. McKenzie, known in golfing circles as the "putting padre", copped top honors in 1961, 1963 and 1967.

41 enter

A field of 41 golfers teed off early Saturday morning under sunny skies at the Hilltop Course in Erin. Bullough, the first man to tee off, played in a foursome with Bruce Shultis, Fred Buchanan and Don Aubin.

Frank "Pipes" Daley won the O.G.A. handicap trophy,

Ten for turk

League scoring leader Bob Turkosz tallied 10 goals and collected four assists, even though coach Bruce Sears wisely chose to rest him for most of the third period and give rookies Bruce Cooksley, Randy Coker and Randy Weldon the extra floor time. Turkosz increased his scoring totals to 42 goals and 24 assists in nine games.

The three rookies, all elevated from the juvenile Ram squad for the game showed plenty of hustle and took their licks with the rest of the team. Cooksley scored Acton's 23rd goal on a pass from Coker.

Windsor goalie Brian Hanson was the victim of his team's loose defensive play. Rams beat him for all 25 goals.

Gary Turkosz turned aside all but two Windsor shots and came close to scoring himself on two occasions. Bruce Murray played the final 10 minutes of the game and gave up the third Windsor goal.

Penalties close

Rams served 14 of the games 25 penalties. Bob Gowland and Olympics' Mike Smith, a boxing champion in the state of Michigan, squared off in a free swinging battle at the two minute mark of the opening period. Both received fighting majors.

Rams defenders Bob Roughley and Stu McCulloch both enjoyed their best games statistically. Roughley scored three goals and assisted on two more, while McCulloch potted a pair of goals and picked up an assist.

Bob Gowland and Mike Marcoux counted a brace of goals apiece. Singles went to Craig Weldon, Bob Waller, Harry

Barens, George McPhail, Bob Andrews and Bruce Cooksley.

Also earning assists were Weldon, Waller and goalie Gary Turkosz, (three each), Gowland and Alan McKenzie (two each), and Marcoux, Harry Barens, Paul Cooper and Randy Coker (one apiece).

Windsor scorers were Mike Smith, Ron Smith and Gary Brezany.

Dave Cooksley and Mike Cooper were sidelined with injuries and Fred Barens missed the game, on account of a Sunday afternoon work shift.

Rams take on Oakville Peaks, here tomorrow (Thursday) night and Mississauga PCO's, Monday June 21. Tuesday, June 22 they travel to Virgil to play Niagara Warriors.
