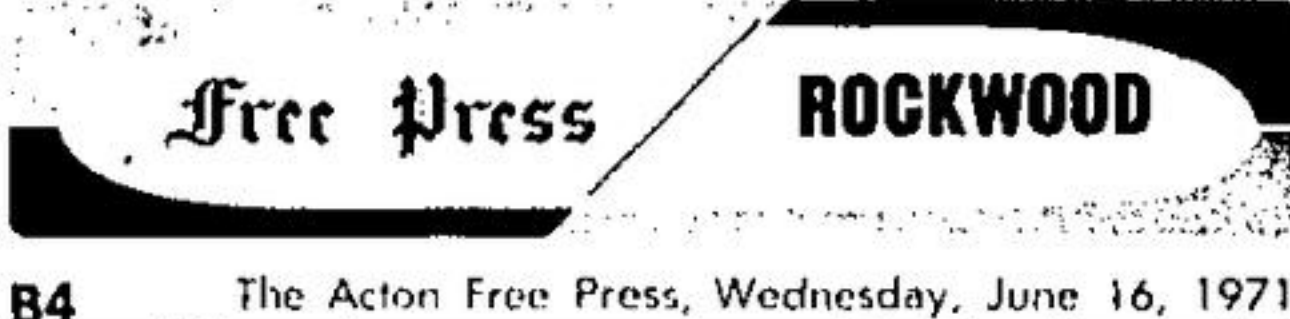

Permit recreation on Hamilton land

A zone change request by William Hamilton, solicitor for Keith and Robert Hamilton, presented recently at the June meeting of the Eramosa Township Council resulted in council's instruction that the

clerk request the township solicitor to draft necessary legislation which would permit recreation uses for the public on privately owned property.

The land under consideration is that of 75 acres of agricultural land on which Keith and Bob Hamilton have previously presented to the township council a request for permission to convert same into a privately owned park, recreation and camping area.

\$62,500 grant

A provincial grant of \$62,500 for further capital development work in the Rockwood Conservation Area has been given approval by the Ontario Department of Energy and Resources Management, M.P.P. John Root advises this newspaper.

Further development planned at the park includes tree planting, undertaking a fish census in the lake and stocking with suitable species, turf and general ground improvement, fencing along Highway 7, provision for additional picnic facilities, construction of the Fourth Line diversion and other general development work proposed by the Grand River Conservation Authority.

New program at Sheridan

Sheridan College will open a new program in September to answer the need for qualified administrators in nursing homes and old age centers.

Called Institutional Management, the new two-year course will train men and women to take jobs at the middle management level in an area which is expanding very rapidly. There are 400 private and public homes for the aged in Ontario, and this number will grow by at least 15 a year, predicts the Aged People's Branch of the Ontario Department of Social and Family Welfare.

The Minister of Health has made a public statement that nursing home care will be an insured service as of April, 1972, said new course co-ordinator Charlie Bennett of Burlington.

Such a government move will mean a "big infusion of public money into nursing homes," he said, and create a big demand for administrative assistance in these homes.
