P.M. comes to Oakville

Canada's Prime Minister Pierre Elliott Trudeau, and possibly his wife Margaret, will visit Oakville next Tuesday, June 22 as the guest of Halton M.P. Rud Whiting and the Halton and Halton East Liberal Association. Whiting said the prime minister will fly in by helicopter from Malton and will be in Oakville for about an hour and a half—from 10:30 a.m. until 12 noon. His visit is part of a two-day information-gathering tour of the Halton, Peel and Toronto areas.

Oakville is the first stop on tour and the prime minister's visit will be concentrated along the Lake Ontario shoreline in a cruise from Oakville to Bronte harbor. The pm's helicopter will land beside the Oakville Power Boat Club at approximately 10:30 a.m. Almost 20 minutes of the tight schedule has been allotted for the signing of autographs and meeting of people in a roped-off area at the club. Mr. Trudeau, Mr. Whiting, Oakville Mayor Maclean Anderson and several other noted guests will then board the RCMP boat "Shaunavon" for the cruise down the Sixteen Mile Creek to the lakefront and along the lakefront to Bronte harbor.

"The people of Oakville and the three levels of government are deeply interested in the future of our two harbor areas and the lakefront as well as in the restoration of pollution-free water in Lake Ontario," he added.

"This tour of the lakefront will give Mr. Trudeau a first-hand look at the situation as it now exists and we will be discussing with him the various plans that have been suggested for its future development." Whiting also said he wanted the prime minister to learn about the operations of TOWARF, the Town of Oakville's water rescue force.
