Plane crash toll five well-known area family

A Lowville area couple and three of their four daughters were killed Sunday afternoon when their light plane crashed into a bush near Tobermory on the Bruce Peninsula.

Dead are 36-year-old L. David Leaver, general manager of Leaver Mushroom Co. Ltd.; his wife Marion; and three daughters Kuthryne, 13; Ruthann, 12; and Jeanette Eleanor, 10. Their youngest daughter, six-year-old Heather Dianne, was injured in the crash and remains in critical condition in Sick Children's Hospital in Toronto.

Parents killed girl orphaned in 401 accident

A five-year-old girl was left orphaned Saturday, following a crash that killed both her parents on Highway 401, two miles east of Milton.

Charlene Marie Hornsath, 5, of Kitchener was taken to Milton District Hospital and treated for shock, after the mishap. Her parents Henry James, 47, and Joan Marilyn, 39, were killed in the crash.

Milton Provincial Police said the car in which they were riding veered out of control on Highway 401, rolled several times and ended up in the westbound lane of the highway. The two deceased victims were thrown 60 and 90

feet from the car. Head injuries Coroner Dr. Ivan Hunter pronounced the two victims dead at the scene of the accident. Death in both cases was caused by multiple head injuries.

The lone survivor was in the custody of the Children's Aid Society until next of kin could be located. Relatives in Saskatchewan were finally informed of the tragedy.

Milton OPP Constable Gary Banks is investigating the accident. No decision has yet been reached on whether or not an inquest will be necessary.

Restrict hunters in Luther Marsh

Restrictions on hunting in the Luther Marsh will be more stringent this fall with about 400 to 600 fewer hunters allowed in than in previous years.

An agreement formally establishing the Luther Marsh Wildlife Management area will be signed by Lands and Forests minister Rene Brunelle and James Bauer, chairman of the Grand River Conservation Authority, at a special ceremony June 18. The agreement provides for the co-operative management of the marsh by the two agencies.

It is designed to achieve the full potential of the area and give the public an opportunity for quality hunting, recreation and education.

Improvements made so far have been to boat launching ramps and observation towers. Further developments planned will include such facilities as observation platform and viewing blinds.

Restrictions on hunters went into effect last year when only two access points to the marsh

were open but this fall only 800 hunters will be allowed in the marsh. Authorities hope the result will be a more pleasing hunt, better harvest control and a reduction of the undesirable effects of wildlife disturbance.

The area has an excellent selection of breeding waterfowl and associated waterbirds such as Wilson's Phalarope. Ospreys also nest there along with herons, bitterns and rails.

Choose Norval farm 1974 International plowing match site

A 200-acre dairy farm near Norval in Esqueving Township has been selected as the site of the International Plowing Match in 1974.

Last week a group of directors of the Ontario Plowmen's Association met with directors from the Halton Plowmen's Association to tour three sites in Halton. They selected the farm of W. T. Craig Reid on 10 Sideroad between Esqueving's Eighth and Ninth Lines. OPA president Jack Taylor of Burlington said the 200-acre farm is well drained and has "excellent plowing soil."

Excellent areas The group also visited the Biggar and Liptay farms in north Oakville, in their search for a suitable site for the 1974 match.

"All three sites were excellent, we could have selected any one of them," Mr. Taylor said.

A site covering 120 acres on the north side of the Reid farm will be used for the "tented city" and match headquarters. Remainder of the Reid farm and about 500 acres of surrounding lands will be used for the plowing and parking lots.

Expect 120,000 Halton directors are confident the Esqueving site's convenient location will draw a record crowd to the International match. "We can expect total attendance of 120,000, especially if we get good weather," Mr. Taylor said.

Although the plowing competitions are traditionally an event for rural people, the International match in recent

years has attracted thousands of urban residents too, and Mr. Taylor promised the 1974 match will have plenty for both urban and rural people to see and enjoy. Halton's central location to neighboring cities like Toronto, Hamilton and Guelph means the 1974 match can expect a good mixture of rural and city visitors, he said.

The match will likely be held during the final week of September, 1974, starting on a Tuesday and ending on a Saturday. The Halton "local committee" under the chairmanship of Ross Segsworth, Burlington, is already naming committees and working to make the '74 match a success.

Define farm for assessor

Support for the definition of farm land for purposes of assessment, as contained in an earlier report, won quick approval from Halton County Council Tuesday.

The county will ask the province to adopt the Report of the Committee on Farm Assessment and Taxation which included a detailed description of farm land and the farm assessment rate schedule.
