Barbers wield explosive bats snap five game losing streak

Pete's Barber Shop came out of their current tallspin in a big way, as they pounded out a total of 31 base hits, to knock off Hillsburgh and Belwood in Tri-County games last week.

Barbers collected 21 hits, including five by winning pitcher Blake Hind, in their 14-8 win over Hillsburgh in the 'burg last Tuesday night.

Hard-throwing Ed Phillips struck out 15 batters and helped his own cause with two singles in five at bats, as Acton trounced Belwood 9-3, here Thursday night.

Fast start
Pete's jumped on Hillsburgh starter Keeler for three first inning runs in Tuesday's game and never relinquished the lead.

Hillsburgh picked up five of their runs in the fifth.

Lead-off hitter Harry Phillips rapped out two doubles and two singles in six at bats for Acton. John Dunn stroked out two triples and a single, Fred Buchanan two singles and a double and Ed Phillips a pair of doubles. Bob Andrews, Bruce Shultz, Jim Bullough and Phil Marzo all singled.

Hind's five hits were all singles. The lanky lefty gave up 11 hits, but kept them well scattered. He struck out eight, walked none and hit two batters.

Belwood tapped Phillips for two runs in the first inning Thursday night, before Ed settled down and held the visitors to a single tally over the final eight innings.

Pete's rallied for six runs in the sixth, after Belwood had taken a 3-2 lead in their half of the sixth on back to back doubles by Kirk and Bagnell.

Acton sent 11 men to the plate in the big inning. First sacker John Dunn belted a home run, his fifth base hit in his last seven trips to the plate.

Shortstop Phil Marzo collected three singles in four plate appearances for the locals. Dunn homered and singled. Ed Phillips and Fred Buchanan both singled twice. Harry Phillips and Ed Smith each singled once.

W. Kirk and B. Kirk had a pair of hits apiece for Belwood. Acton committed a total of only

three errors in the two games. Barbers play in Hespeler Friday night and in Glen Williams against first place Norval, Tuesday June 29.
