The first time we saw a deer after moving here (12 years ago) we got all excited. Not only was it the first I had seen, other than in the zoo or a park, but it was a huge buck. After that, we saw deer regularly as they wandered through the property, sometimes coming quite close to the house.

Everyone always dropped whatever they were doing and rushed to the window to watch. They came singly, or in pairs, moving cautiously but gracefully, grazing all the way. Now and then we'd catch a glimpse of a doe moving through the bushes with a small fawn (and one had twins!) not venturing into the open at all.

Only hoof prints But as the number of houses increased, the deer sightings decreased. When areas of bush were cleared the small herd that grazed in a neighboring pasture disappeared, and the only sign that a few were still around was the odd hoofprint by our stream. So last month, when I looked out the kitchen window one evening and saw a young buck jumping our pasture fence to graze, I was delighted. Son Jim and I snuck down to the barn and watched for quite a while before the mosquitoes drove us up to the house.

And I was doubly delighted last night to see him back again. Being quite curious as to where he went from here, I headed back down to the barn again to sit and watch. But as I peeked around one corner, I found him peering back. We both jerked back, then cautiously looked again. I could see one big ear come into view, then one big eye. Then we both leaned back, again.

Never a deer. He took a deep breath and blew it out through his nose, making a high-pitched vibrating sound, much the same as a youngster makes in abortive attempts to blow grass through his thumbs.

The buck did this three times, then wheeled and took off into the brush, blowing all the way. Even when I got back to the house, I could hear him way off in the distance, the sound of his blowing echoing through the trees.

I feel a little glum about scaring him off. I hope he comes back.

Last week, Gord bought me a Hibachi, and I've been having the greatest time experimenting. I love meat cooked over coals, and have been trying vegetables too.

BARBECUED PORK CHOPS
Combine 1 cup soy sauce and 1 crushed clove garlic. Marinate 6 1-inch thick pork chops for 1 hour, turning frequently. Broil for 45 minutes, basting with Barbecue Chili Sauce.

BARBECUE CHILI SAUCE.
Cook 1/2 cup chopped onion, 1/2 cup minced green pepper, 3 minced cloves garlic in 4 Tbsp. butter. Add 3 cups canned tomatoes, 1 cup broth, 1 Tbsp. salt, 1/4 Tsp. pepper, 1 Tbsp. chili powder, 1 Tbsp. corn starch, 1Tsp. sugar. Bring to boil then simmer 10 minutes. (After mine cooled, I put it in the blender for half a minute.)

I used this one night on steak, and last night I braised up a blade roast on the stove, then spread it with the sauce and barbecued it for half an hour. It was extremely nice.

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
