Says progress report of religion committee just "waste of time"

A progress report from the ad hoc committee on religious education, filed with Halton County Board of Education on Thursday, was termed "a waste of time" by one of the members of the committee which filed it.

Burlington board trustee Noel Cooper said the report by his committee chairman trustee I. D. Palmer of Oakville was full of

"ifs, ands, buts and maybes." "Come up with some recommendations on religious education and don't beat around the bush with reports like this," he charged the chairman. Palmer replied he was only trying to keep the board informed of his committee's progress.

Another trustee who sits on the same committee, Hubert Clohecy

of Burlington, admitted it was a waste of time to file the report but he added, "we are making progress" and hoped in three or four months the committee would have some definite recommendations.

The 25-member committee first met in February and has held eight regular meetings plus several sub-committee meetings. Two sub-committees were formed, one to investigate moral development from kindergarten to grade 13 and prepare a curriculum, the other to investigate resource materials and films for a course on world religions as a credit course.

During the half hour discussion

it was noted opening exercises are not being held in some of the schools, and it was feared some of the teachers were not having their classes recite the Lord's Prayer each day because it has recently been omitted from its regular place at the front of the daily class register. The opening exercises were drawn up in 1944 and some parts were revised in the early 1960's.

Assistant to the director of education, E.M. Lavender suggested it was "not some sinister plot" that the prayer was not being printed... "maybe the government was on an economy drive."

Issue stop-work order start clean-up campaign

Jim Delaney, Erin township building inspector, was directed to issue a stop-work order to Pete Adams of the 3rd Line. Council maintain the extension being built on his small Key-Fab factory is in contravention of the building by-law.

Reeve Lloyd Lang commented that Mr. Adams must receive the same treatment as every one else, and must confront council for a building permit if desired.

Council then turned to a discussion of forcing residents to clean up junk and wrecked cars. One problem, it was pointed out, is that people who have cleaned

up before seem to have just made room to bring in more junk.

Clean up campaign
 It was decided to go ahead with a clean-up campaign starting with two residents, taking them to court if necessary, then moving on to another two.

Residents will be notified in writing, and will be directed to comply with the by-law in 14 days or be taken to court.
