Southpaw Blake Hind went all the way to pick up the win. He gave up nine hits, struck out eight and walked two.

Jim Bullough beats jinx wins Acton Meadows title

A two year jinx ended happily for Jim Bullough on the 18th green at Acton Meadows Sunday afternoon, when the slender golfer dropped a two foot putt for a par and won his first Acton Meadows club championship.

The par 4 18th was the scene of heartbreaking defeats for Bullough in 1969 and 1970. Two years ago he was tied with Mike Prystasz in match play competition, coming down the final fairway, but lost the hole. In medal play last year, Bullough bogged the final hole, while Prystasz won his second straight title with a par. The two were tied in strokes after 71 holes.

Stu is close
Bullough's championship win Sunday came after a nip and tuck battle with Stu McDonald over the final 18 holes of the 72 hole competition. Bullough had a one stroke lead after 54 holes.

After 17 holes Sunday, he led by two. McDonald pushed his tee shot out to the left side of the fairway, which makes a dog leg right to the green. Bullough hit a fine tee shot that landed right at the centre of the fairway. For his second, McDonald used a wedge, but his high shot was just short of the green and landed in a trap on the right side. He blasted out and two putted for a bogie, but Bullough came out with a par and took the title by three strokes.

Down three
Down three strokes to Bullough and Bruce Shults after 36 holes, McDonald picked up two, when Bullough slipped to 79 in the third round Saturday and Shults blew to an 81. Bullough's 79 was surprising, considering the fact he hit four trees during the round.

In four rounds, 72-76-79-74 gave him a 72 hole total of 301. McDonald carded scores of 78-73-77-76 for 304. Bill Peddie placed third with scores of 78-74-76-66 for 334, one stroke ahead of Bruce Shults, 74-74-81-86 for 315. Bullough chopped 12 strokes off Prystasz' winning total of last year. Mike did not compete this year.

Three other players completed the 72 holes. They were Terry Slaven, 77-84-80-80 for 321, Fred Kroeger 77-85-78-85 for 321 and club captain Ron Whitham, 77-84-
