Obituary

Roy Smith former Halton engineer

Roy F. Smith, retired County of Halton engineer, died at Oakville on Sunday, June 13. He was in his 78th year.

Mr. Smith was Halton's first county engineer. He came to Halton as a consulting engineer to build two large bridges over the 12 and 16 Mile Creeks on Highway 5 in 1918 and was engaged as full time engineer and roads superintendent in 1929. At that time most of the roads were dirt or clay and he supervised the development of a sophisticated roads system which today sees 80 per cent of the county's roads paved.

Born in Trenton, he graduated from Queen's University in 1916 as a civil engineer. He remained with the county roads department until retiring in 1968.

Over the years Mr. Smith also did some consulting engineering work for other municipalities, mainly Milton, on a part time basis.

He was one of the pioneers of the County Engineers Association formed in 1950 and was its president in 1954. He was a 48-year member of the Ontario Good Roads Association and a 27-year member of the Canadian Good Roads Assoc. when he retired.

ACTON COUNCIL BRIEFS

At the regular meeting Tuesday, Acton council:

—Endorsed a resolution from Burlington recommending the reorganization of the Halton County Technical Co-ordinating committee. Clerk J. Hurst said the committee, comprised of county clerks would cover certain services not fully covered in the first brief to present the county situation more clearly to the Minister.

—Endorsed four resolutions from the City of Barrie dealing with (1) changes in fees for tax certificates, tax exemptions for buildings of the Agricultural Society where a use other than agricultural predominates, amendments to the Assessment Act pertaining to assessment of parking lots provided for employees and the request that the provincial government make general unconditional grants in lieu of conditional grants.

—Agreed to engage Sparkle Janitor Service for office cleaning at the town office at \$150 per month.

—Extended congratulations to the Parks and Recreation Committee on the success of their summer festival. "It was a bang-up night," observed Councillor Masales, "and happened to fall on my birthday. It was a pretty lavish birthday party." "I hope we have more," enthused the mayor.
