Leaders Mrs. Cox and Mrs. Henderson led in a discussion about how to cook vegetables so that they are most nutritious and delicious. Afterwards Mrs. Cox demonstrated how to thin a garden. The meeting was ended with refreshments served by Brenda Kingsmill.

Vegetables discussed. Everyone took part in a discussion about the place of vegetables in meal planning. They learned that adults and children alike should have one serving of potatoes and at least two servings of other vegetables, preferably green or yellow and often raw vegetables daily. They began plans for a barbecue for the 4-H girls and their families in September. Afterwards all sampled Swiss chard and agreed that it tasted very much like spinach but less bitter. The meeting ended with refreshments.

The roll call "One vegetable in my garden which needs thinning" was answered by the members. Some of the answers were rutabagas, carrots, beets and Swiss Chard.

Vocal music is option in Halton high schools

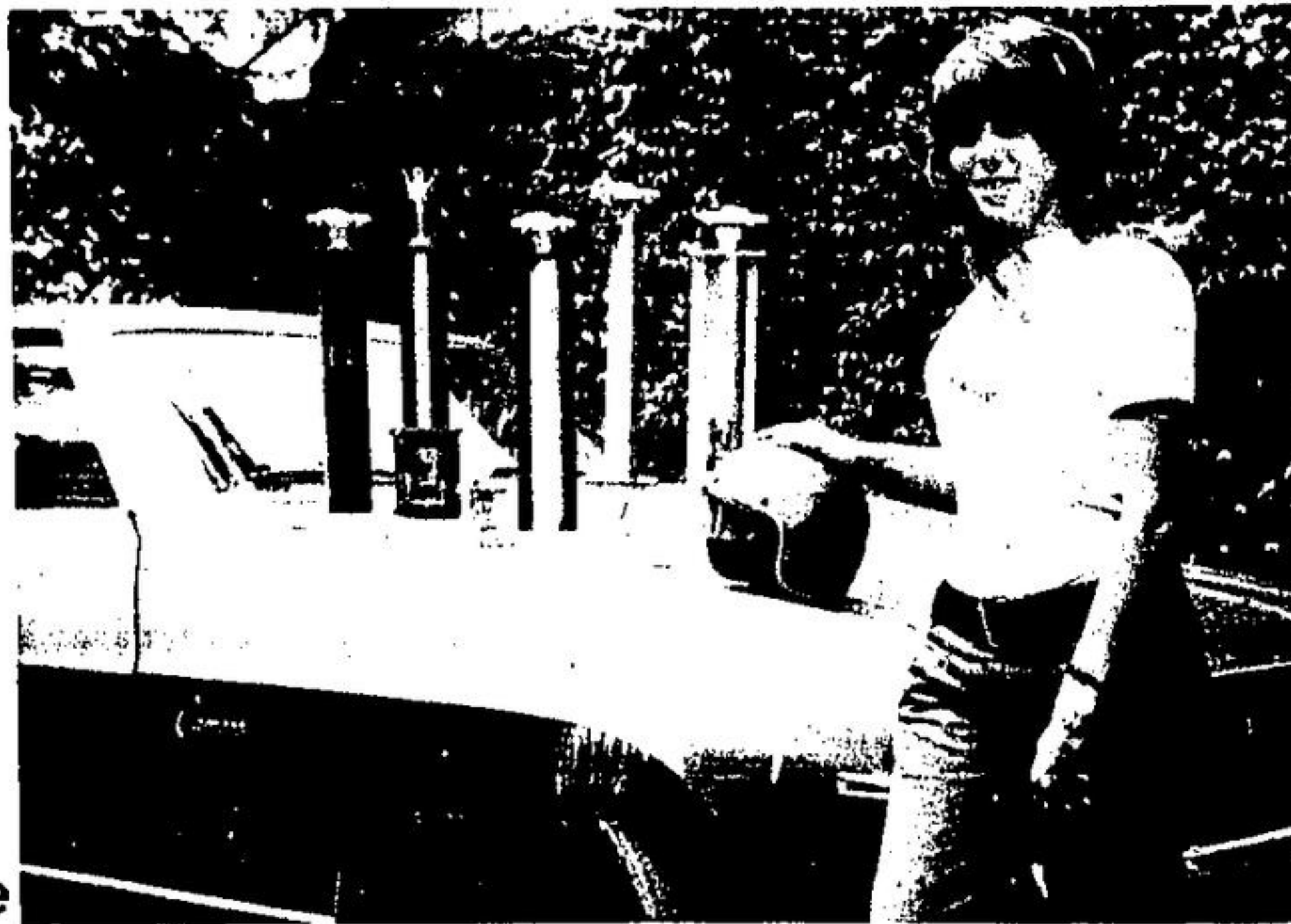
Vocal music courses will be offered as an option in Halton high schools and two of the county's schools are ready to start the program this fall.

At a meeting, recently the Halton County Board of Education approved provision of vocal music courses starting at the grade nine level, although the board warned the program must operate within the existing pupil-teacher ratio. The executive committee warned there are dangers of fragmentation of the program and diminishing numbers of students taking the course in the senior grades.

The option would continue to grade 12. Two schools in Oakville and Burlington are reported ready to offer the program this fall.

But the board has shelved an instrumental music program for interested students in middle schools. A moratorium on such courses was established in November of 1969 because of "significant financial implications."
