

NEWS of the district

FERGUS—Fergus postmaster Harry Munn has confirmed that door-to-door postal service will start in Fergus September 1. Residents of the town can also expect a remodelled post office with lock boxes removed. It is expected the post office will hire four or five letter carriers to serve the 2,000 eligible customers. Jobs are available only to residents of the area served by the post office.

ELORA—The Victoria St. bridge in this village has been closed to pedestrian traffic by council after word was received that no subsidy was available to make proper repairs to the bridge. The provincial Department of Transportation and Communication noted there is a relatively new bridge only a block away and a new bridge is being considered nearby. The condition of the bridge has been a sore point in the village since it was alleged seven-year-old Timothy Walser fell through a hole in the old structure and drowned. An eight-foot steel link fence has been erected at each end of the bridge.

MILTON—Anti-litter Week in Milton was a tremendous success, according to Milton's own "Mr. Clean" — Councillor Art Melanson. Special garbage pick-ups yielded several truckloads of litter and garbage. Students made posters which were displayed around town and then refused to accept the \$225 in prize money that the town council offered for the poster contest. As a result the town fathers used the money to purchase two new litter bins for the business section, suitably inscribed, "Donated by Milton Schoolchildren". Three other containers have joined them since, donated by private firms and people.

ERIN—Borden Wheeler was presented with the horticultural trophy for the best kept property in the lawn and garden contest sponsored by the Erin Horticultural Society. Judge Harvey Gerrie of Elora was impressed with the amount of labor that went into the appearance of grounds and gardens at the rear of the homes. The properties of C. Hartwell and Mrs. C. Burt were second and third respectively. Awards were presented at the annual flower show presented by the society which had 23 exhibitors and 183 entries.

GEORGETOWN—Warned by the Ontario Water Resources Commission that the sewage disposal plant is operating at capacity, Georgetown council is considering clamping a "freeze" on residential development in the town. More study is planned before any strong action is taken. The O.W.R.C. noted that until phase two of the proposed sewer reconstruction is underway the town plant could be overloaded.

GLEN WILLIAMS—A modernistic memorial in stone was dedicated to the war dead of Glen Williams at a picturesque riverbank site Sunday, June 27. The cairn was the brainchild of Gerry Inglis, R.R. 5, Georgetown, well known stonemason. He and Bob McMaster obtained permission to use the land from Halton county and then went ahead. Several other Glen residents also assisted.

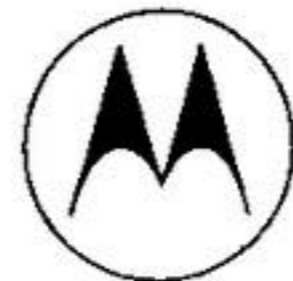
