## Fire rages Sunday at Esquesing dump

Two calls to the Esquesing township dump kept Acton Firefighters busy Sunday.

The first call at 7.30 in the morning brought the truck to the dump to smother a small pile of burning garbage.

More water Extra water had to be hauled from Glen Williams by truck for the second call Sunday night about 8.30, when the entire face of the dump was flaming.

Two trucks from Acton went to

the fire. The first returned shortly before midnight and the second didn't return until 1 a.m.

Esquesing Council recently received a government order stating they must cover all garbage at the land fill site completely.

## SPIN collection is small but organizers press on

"We're not disappointed or downhearted," Mrs. June Andrews explained as she commented on the limited success of the first attempt to SPIN (Stop Pollution in Nassagaweya).

From there the materials will go to Burlington to a larger depot and then on to Hamilton where the recycling is done.

### Two depots

The two depots were set up at McPhail's (opposite the Campbellville Community Pond) and at Brookville Hall. Mrs. Andrews said there wasn't as much turned in as expected but felt that by going ahead, more people are aware of the program. She is confident her group will meet with greater success this Saturday at the second collection.

"Some didn't really understand

what we were doing even though they read about it," Mrs. Andrews said, noting that one hurdle the group must overcome is educating the public.

## Wrong turn red face

Parks Board chairman Hugh Patterson subtly suggested this week the board might consider purchasing and installing signs for park washrooms following an incident which he didn't bother embroidering.

Despite all the warnings the band stand was subjected to all manner of abuse so Mr. Townsley decided it was useless to lock people out.

## Driver complaints

Acton detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police report they have received many complaints from citizens about drivers and with the help of the citizens charges have been laid.

"They stress the co-operation of townspeople is all they need to apprehend drivers who break the law."

"A lot of people are getting fed up with them," one officer said.

## Beardmore's help ensure Acton's fire protection

Beardmore and Company is working in co-operation with Acton Firefighters to ensure guaranteed fire protection for the town, fire chief Mick Holmes told the Free Press last week.

The company has generously agreed to provide what amounts to a 24 hour fire call answering service, through the phone in the company boiler room.

Take calls Boiler room employees will take fire calls on the phone, one of seven in town reserved for fire calls. The boiler room has a round the clock shift. Employees will be able to press the button there, to start the fire siren going. First firefighter to reach the fire hall then takes the message on the whereabouts of the fire over

the phone from the boiler room employee.

During the summer months especially, Chief Holmes felt it was asking a little too much to have the four brigade members, who have fire call phones in their homes, stay in town on weekends just to wait for the phone to ring. The other two fire phones are located in the fire hall and town office, both of which are unoccupied on weekends.

### Company co-operates

He approached members of the fire committee of Acton council with the problem and Mayor Doby worked out details for the guaranteed answering service, through the co-operation of Beardmore president Norm Branda.

"Beardmore's have been very interested in the Acton Fire Department over the years and have always been willing to help us out at anytime," Chief Holmes said.

The Acton brigade has nine Beardmore employees among its volunteers.

People are reminded that the number to call in case of fire is still 953-1212. The number serves for all seven phones.

## Only one accident
