The speaker, Rev. N. L. Gostonyi, based an inspiring message on Psalm 147, with special reference to verse 8. We live in a strange world, a world of scientific miracles, but man seems to have lost his faith. Many years ago, an unknown poet wrote of the God of incredible things, who made grass grow on the mountains. Life is full of the miraculous and divine.

Twelve ordinary men with the whole world against them, seemed dedicated to a lost cause. Now one third of the world calls on Jesus' name. The explanation? God makes grass grow on the mountains.
