He rapped the board's neglect to set un a joint committee to study the merit plan system and suggests this, and the lack of time, combined to compet rejection. However, he said joint research into the plan would be acceptable to teachers in the future.

Won't match offer Regarding the two year contract: Ramautarsingh said the teachers expressed a willingness to accept what Toronto teachers were offered but the board stated they were not prepared to match that offer,

so the proposal fell through. The teachers proposed a 16 month contract for this year only so negotiations each year could be completed before the board struck its budget but the board refused, preferring to deal with a locked budget.

The Halton OSSTF president wondered why the board expected teachers to adhere to economic guide lines and cellings proposed by the government when Peel, Toronto and Hamilton boards of education as well as firemen, policemen and others did not adhere to them.

Better offers

He also maintained: 1. Twenty per cent of teachers would get no negotiated salary increase in the board offer.

2. The board fulled to mention in its press release that the Peel Board of Education offered its teachers a much better salary agreement in spite of a lower pupil-teacher ratio and Hamilton made an even better offer. He suggested the best Halton teachers would soon leave for the surrounding boards and the quality of education in the county would suffer.

3. The board's reasons for rejecting a \$75,000 grant were based on the fact ratepayers had to contribute 50 per cent. The teachers consider it a good investment to receive \$37,500 instead of nothing.

conclusion. Runautursingh said the board must change its attitude to one of co-operation and called for meaningful discussion for un amicable settlement.

# 44 decayed, old trees doomed by tree surgeon

and oldest trees toppled last week-slated for the saw by Moffitt Tree Removal firm of Preston.

tree surgeons. considered by the mayor to be "the best in the country", came to town, assessed trees which old, decayed and dangerous, and then proceeded to trim or cut them down completely.

Despite some complaints and sorrow at the loss of the trees, the mayor this week claimed the contractors here are the kind of people who will always save a tree if they can, "We feel we have the best tree surgeons in the country," Mr. Duby asserts.

#### Regular program

The project is part of the town's regular program of assessing trees to see which might be becoming dangerous. The tree surgeons determine the health of the tree and give advice. In some instances, they have changed their mind about a doomed tree, and decided after they trimmed that it did not need to come down after all. Most of the trees were on town

property-such as at the music centre, in the school yard, entrance to the park, in front of Knox church and the Baptist church, at the Legion and the chicken drive-in, and in the Crescent. Some were on the borderlines

of lots, and the cost is shared with a homeowner. Some on private property were also taken down by request, with the homeowner assuming the cost.

#### Mostly maple Most of the trees were maples,

including the seven taken down on Bower Ave. It was the shade of these spreading trees that made the town's prettiest residential street truly a "bower".

In the Crescent, it was mostly poplars that fell. A few of the trees were elms.

#### Spare that tree

In a couple of cases, trees which the contractors felt were dangerous have been left, due to the wishes of nearby residents. However, Mayor Duby recalls that one listed tree, kept for three
