

Balanced scoring attack helps Rams whip Midland

Acton Rams whipped Midland Hurons 21-9 here Monday night in the opening game of the best of seven O.L.A. junior "C" semi-final series in front of a crowd of 312 noisy fans. Second game of the set is slated for Midland, tonight (Wednesday) at 8:30.

Rams completely dominated play in the second and third periods, after Midland goalie Brian Cook kept the first period score even at 5-5 with some brilliant netmending. Acton held 7-2 and 9-2 margins in the second and third periods respectively.

Refuses to concede

Although his team was soundly beaten, Midland coach Chick Chadwick refused to concede the series and promised his lads would bounce back. Hurons brought only 12 players with them and Chadwick expects five absentees, including Brian Hook, a top goal scorer, to dress for tonight's second game.

In spite of two losses last week, Acton girls' softball team has been improving steadily under the tutelage of Jim James and Don Price.

The girls lost 7-2 to Glen Williams here last Wednesday night and 11-4 to Drumquin, in Drumquin Thursday night. Both teams handed the Acton girls much more severe beatings earlier in the season.

Joanne Landsborough allowed Glen Williams only eight scattered hits but Acton girls only managed to score twice against Glen hurler Betty Stafford, although they outhit the visitors 14-8. Acton left eight runners on base.

Doris Black led Acton at the plate with two singles and a triple in four at bats. Marilyn McEachern had two singles and a double, Brenda McClure a single and a triple, Joanne Landsborough a triple and Patti Dunn, Judy Nicolak, Shirley Mitchell and Lynn Krzyzik one single apiece.

Drumquin scored seven of their runs in the first three innings Thursday night. The teams battled on even terms the rest of the way.

Doris Black continued her hot hitting, rapping out two singles and a triple for Acton.

Maureen Gerth handled pitching chores for Acton. Terri Laling picked up the win for Drumquin.

Big guns for Lions Club in Saturday's win were John Griese, Mike Overland, Mark Overland and Billy Sheppard. Each collected three safeties.

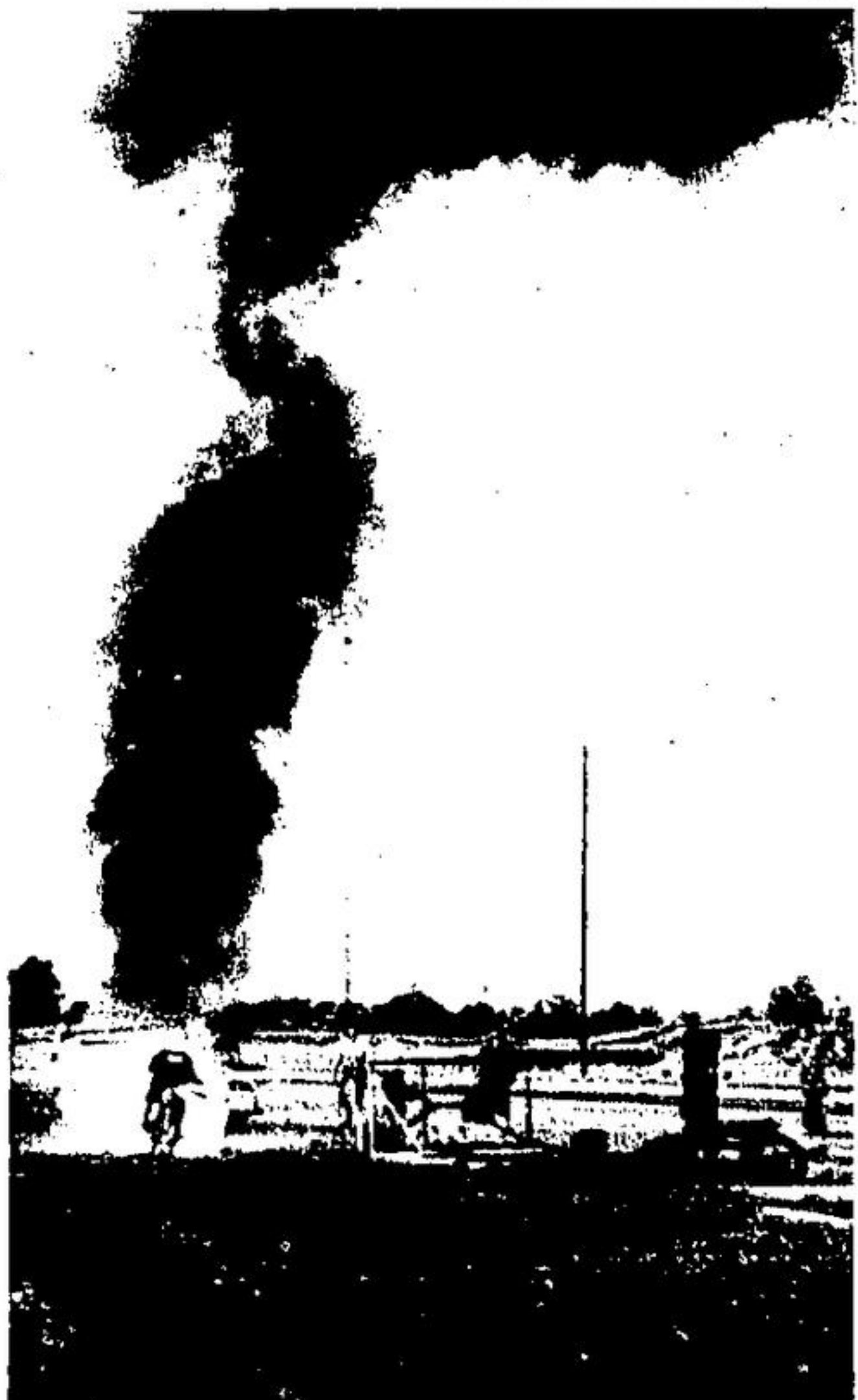
Mike Ashley, Gord McArthur and Dan Porty had three each for the losers. Jack Evans swatted a two run homer.
