## Let's talk about horses

**QUESTION:** I have a very well fed mare who insists on eating her straw bedding. She gets more than enough food but the problem still persists. Any suggestions?

**ANSWER:** Check the mare for worms and make sure she has lots of various minerals. This bed eating is usually just a habit to alleviate boredom at night, so feed most of her hay during the evening in a rack or hay set. Here are several things you can try: change the bedding to shavings or sawdust; muzzling the mare after eating; or sprinkling the straw with disinfectant. Mind you, I tried the last one on an old mare of mine, she merely continued to eat the straw but with her lip curled in disgust. Good luck!
