Deer deaths rise . . . more to come

Ninety-six deer kills were investigated and documented in the Hespeler Division of the Lake Huron District during the six month period Jan. 1 to June 30. Here in Halton 17 deer deaths were recorded.
Causes of death were mainly—"Struck by vehicle" (55) and "Killed by dogs" (21).
The Hespeler Division is comprised of the Counties of Brant, Halton, Oxford, Waterloo, Wentworth and Wellington with the exception of the Townships of West Luther, Arthur and Minto.
Deer kills by county are—Jan. 1 to June 30, Wellington 30, Wentworth 21, Halton 17, Oxford 11, Waterloo 11, Brant 6—total 96.

number of deer kills in the entire Lake Huron District of 10 counties was 132. The total has risen annually since.
When this year's crop of fawns begin to move extensively this fall with the adults, the resulting car-deer accidents will contribute to more smashed hoods, fenders and windshields, with a resulting loss of recreational hunting, wasted meat, and an all time high for the number of deer killed by means other than legal hunting.
Plans are continuing for a practical and acceptable method of harvesting the surplus annual crop of this renewable natural resource.

Spectacular
The most spectacular incident was a yearling buck that jumped through the dining room window of a Queen Street residence in the centre of the town of Preston. After breaking the inner breakfast room window, the kitchen table and assorted fixtures, the deer was finally subdued but died of cuts, bruises and shock.
The latest incident just two weeks ago, was a collision between a deer and a car on Courtland Ave. in the city of Kitchener. The deer went through the windshield of the car and out the passenger side window. The car was not carrying a passenger fortunately, so no one was injured. The deer was badly hurt with broken legs and had to be destroyed.
There has not been an open season for deer in the Hespeler Division since 1967. In 1968 the

Suggests move to Oakville
Some trustees were surprised when Trustee R. E. Goodin of Oakville suggested the administration investigate the possibility of moving their headquarters to Ortona Barracks in Oakville.
The recommendation came just two days after the board moved from Oakville to Burlington. Burlington Trustee Bill Priestner said the Oakville area had never been considered as a permanent site for the headquarters. "It is not central for anybody except those people who live in that part of Oakville," he said.
