

"We don't want hunters" — Reeve

Hunting, wildlife program considered for township

"Quite frankly we don't want hunters in Nassagaweya Township but you're asking us to invite them," Township Reeve

Mrs. A. MacArthur told Doug Howell, an extension biologist with the Department of Lands and Forests.

Howell, accompanied by two members of the Halton Sportsmen's Association, attended Nassagaweya Council's regular meeting Monday to explain the wildlife management program his department and the sportsmen hope to initiate in Nassagaweya Township.

zones would be established to provide the same safety and peace for those landowners not under agreement that had land abutting other land that was under agreement.

Howell explained the program would be similar to one now operating in Ancaster. "We have had very few complaints from there since we put the program in," he said.

He told council the program simply gives the landowner the choice of having some of his land developed for wild game. He said those violating a restricted zone would meet with much stiffer penalties than they would at present.

The township's current by-law allows hunting with the written permission of the landowner. Howell is asking that the township change the by-law to read "written permission or under agreement with the Minister of Lands and Forests."

He noted additional enforcement could be carried out under the program and said at the present time neither the OPP or the department would enforce the township's by-law.

The department will provide assistance in land improvement for all forms of wildlife. The assistance would come after the first year and in the form of labor and materials and would improve the aesthetic value of the land.

White Deputy Reeve Don McMillan and councillors Jim Watson and J.C. McIntyre saw some merit in the plan, Reeve MacArthur remained in opposition to any change in the by-law.

"Our by-law is successful. We don't want hunters here and we haven't had complaints since we passed the by-law. I don't see any real reason why we should change it," she said.

Councillor Watson said he saw merit in the plan but only if it included parts of Esquesing, Oakville and Burlington so the heavy concentration wouldn't occur all in Nassagaweya.

Councillor McIntyre envisaged better protection for landowners under the program than what currently exists. A decision was deferred until a full council could be available. Councillor Art Gibson was absent.

Crowds strain Kelso facilities

"Use the park Monday to Friday and beat the crowds", Halton Region Conservation Authority advertising for Kelso Conservation Area is saying these days.

Phenomenal crowds on summer weekends are putting a strain on the park's facilities. Visitors complain there are not enough picnic tables to handle the crowds of picnickers.

On the recent civic holiday weekend a total of 1,549 vehicles entered the park in three days — 122 on Saturday, 922 Sunday and 505 Monday. This past weekend's heat wave brought a crowd of 407 cars Saturday and 1,609 on Sunday. Those are not record figures — Kelso has had over 1,700 vehicles on the grounds on several occasions. Figures from the HRCA office do not include season's pass holders, buses or pedestrians.
