## Petition seeks tennis players

With the game of tennis in the upswing across Canada, according to recreational authorities, there is hope that Rockwood too will boast facilities which could encourage residents from all areas of Eramosa to participate.

A meeting was held last Monday night in the St. John's Parish Hall in Rockwood to discuss the findings of a steering committee after a letter about the proposed club including tentative fees, had been circulated throughout the township. It was learned that tremendous vocal interest had been created in the villages of Everton and Rockwood with ten families in Eden Mills prepared to support and anxious to take part.

**Expected costs**  
"Part of the fees" said the letter, "would go to support the objectives of the club and part to repay the Recreation Committee for the cost of laying asphalt, installing nets, and improving the lighting at the skating arena in the Rockwood Ball Park" where the proposed courts would be set up.

Other costs to be realized of course, would include fencing on the outside perimeter and the actual lining of the tennis courts. Surfacing the area with asphalt, already on the "agenda for the future" of the Eramosa Recreation Committee would serve two-fold benefits and complete the wintertime skating area.

**Rates high**  
Known as the sport in which nearly all ages can participate, the physical fitness value in

games of tennis is rated high in the brackets of athletics and those interested in seeing the club materialize feel that its contribution to township recreation would prove invaluable as well as presenting the image of an up-dated community with an eye to the future "leisure hour programs" proposed by the Recreational Departments of our governments.

Too many residents from Everton, Eden Mills and Rockwood have to leave Eramosa to participate in athletic endeavours. With the exception of baseball there is no other physical outlet other than badminton which is played during the winter months at the Rockwood Centennial School gymnasium.

The steering committee of course, realizes that the few bodies taking advantage of the wintertime program would not be enough to warrant the cost of tennis courts and, to attempt to submit the proposal of court expenditures they will have to ascertain how many residents would participate before it would be a feasible consideration for any Recreation Committee.

**Take petition**  
During the next two weeks steering committee members will make rounds throughout Everton, Eden Mills, and Rockwood, requesting citizens interested in giving their support, to sign a petition that reads: "We the undersigned, are interested in supporting this club financially by becoming a member in one of the following categories for at least one year: Annual Family

membership \$20.; Annual Adult membership \$10.; and Annual Junior Membership set at \$5 for 18 year olds and under."

Those signing the petition are not necessarily compelled to play, and in many cases the committee leans on the foresight of those who cannot play of seeing such over-all benefits to the community as: Home-time recreation rather than in outside arenas, keeping young adults occupied in worthwhile activity and having a place where people can play together in endeavours

which will stimulate goodwill and healthy community thinking. Tennis is everyone's game and everybody should have the opportunity to enjoy it.

After the petitions have been circulated the steering committee members will meet again on date of August 23 to consider the results and if community interest warrants tennis courts in the area they will prepare a brief for presentation to the Eramosa Recreation Committee at their September meeting.

## Top notch instruction for four new courses

Based on a questionnaire sent throughout the township requesting response from residents interested in a fall and winter creative arts program, four subjects will be introduced at the Rockwood Centennial School under the sponsorship of the Eramosa Recreation Committee.

Many residents wishing to participate in the scheduled classes suggested that only top notch instruction be introduced rather than talented but uncertified local instructors. The committee organizing the program are pleased that the four most popular subjects will have at their helm, teachers highly qualified whose talents are being utilized already in Guelph and Acton schools and recreation buildings.

**Rugs, sewing**  
Dorothy Comfort will be handling the rug hooking and design course and she has been an instructor for the Guelph Creative Arts program for some years.

Mrs. Audrey Johnston, a graduate of an English needlecraft school, will be conducting a class which will include crewel work, crocheting, and other phases of sewing crafts.

John Mattar, Art Media OAC, OSA, a teacher at the Guelph Collegiate G.C.V.I., and also at the night time programs of the Guelph Creative Arts, will be teaching drawing and design as well as a mixed media of art. For the upholstery classes, another suggested subject which received top priority, Earl Jensen of Guelph will be on hand. Mr. Jensen has been associated with the extension program held in Acton as well as in other vicinities and is considered one of the area's best instructors in this field.

**Good response**  
Although the response to the proposed program has been tremendous the committee setting up the schedule is hesitant to include more subjects until those responding have actually

registered. Registration date will be on Tuesday, September 21, at the Rockwood Centennial School at 8 p.m. when allotted classes and hours will be specified.

As community involvement was the original plan behind the sessions the organizing committee hopes that gradually the program will include all phases of creative arts requested with classes available to everyone who wishes to participate. If it proves worthwhile plans will be made to carry on during the winter months after Christmas depending on the interest of the district residents.

**September start**  
Letters will be sent out to all those who sent in the questionnaires but registrations in September will be on a "first come, first served basis" and, with fewer openings available than the number of requests received, residents wishing to participate are warned to remember the registration date and place. Everyone will be welcomed but all four courses are limited to 15 members per class.
