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Praise, criticize fire department

Milton Fire Department came in for some praise and some criticism at the same meeting of Nassagaweya Council last week. Council agreed to send a congratulatory letter to three members of the brigade for receiving long service awards.

Later in the same meeting complaints about the department not reacting to the first call at a recent fire were discussed. Deputy Reeve Don McMillan told council of a case where a hydro wire was burning. According to the complaint filed with council, the department said they would not go to the fire unless the building was endangered.

So many calls

Clerk Campbell Thompson said the department had received so many calls about minor incidents that really didn't warrant men and trucks going out that they had become more particular about which calls they attended. Councillor Jim Watson defended the department and

noted a recent case where the brigade travelled to Lowville after someone had put tupperware in the dishwasher and a fire resulted.

Always go

Asked to comment on the situation, Fire Chief A. E. Clement told this paper he was unaware of any calls his department had not reacted to immediately.

"If we are called we go. We don't know if it is a false alarm or not. If it is a hydro line burning we won't touch the line but we will stand by and protect the buildings or property. Hydro lines are too dangerous for us to be involved with. It is up to the hydro to turn off the power and so forth," the chief said.

the land there was only marginal and not really fit for agriculture.

Gamblers lose

McKeough replied that developers and people who took chances on accepting mortgages were taking a gamble and in this case they lost out because the

area did not fit into the plan for the area. The developer often loses money and this often includes others. . . and that included 87 in that particular area. He promised no relief. The plan also revealed that the high power hydro transmission line which evoked much controversy in Nassagaweya township last year will definitely be located in Zone Two of the Region, crossing the townships of Nassagaweya, Eramosa, Erin, Chinguacousy, Albion, King, Whitchurch, Uxbridge and Pickering. The precise location of the 500 k.v. line will be discussed with the various municipalities before any final decision is made.

the individual identity of centres. The width of the Parkway Belt will vary depending on the function that it is planned to perform in each area:

1. Service or utility corridor.
2. Urban limiter or separator.
3. Environmental buffer.
4. Low intensity uses.

To date delineation of the Belt has not proceeded far enough to make the details of the system publicly known, except for the Burlington area. There they have decided on a Belt of approximately 2,000 feet in width running along the Niagara Escarpment with a scenic road 100-150 feet below the top of the Escarpment.

GO trains and new Jetport? The report says the Government is encouraged by the degree of co-operation received by the federal Ministry of Transport with respect to the review of existing rail lines for possible future commuter use, and the location of the second International Airport. We believe, it says, that the location of the airport can be a major stimulus to the development of the Region and that its location should not be dependent solely on the current direction of population trends.

HALTON County Council HIGHLIGHTS

At the August meeting of Halton County Council, members:

—Accepted the resignation of EMO Co-ordinator Bruce McGregor effective July 30.

—Deferred a resolution prohibiting the use of snowmobiles on county roads until municipalities had had ample time to consider it.

—Learned the spray now used by the county is not as effective as a weed killer as 2-4-5-D but noted the poor results this year might be accounted for by the late date at which spraying began.

—Authorized the county engineer to retain the services of W. H. Carr to carry out road widening on 15 Sideroad in Esquesing.

—Approved a move made by the Manor Board of Management expressing interest in buying eight acres of the property known as the Ortona Barracks in Oakville.

—Authorized payment of the final instalment of the county grant to Joseph Brant Hospital, Burlington in the amount of \$466,000.

—Authorized the pre-design work to be done for improvements on county road 20 through Limehouse.

—Passed a by-law estimating \$43,000 as the sum necessary for maintenance of roads and bridges in the county.

—Passed a by-law allowing the county to enter into an agreement with McCormick and Rankin and Associates Limited to design the reconstruction of Main St. in Milton from Bronte to Martin St.

—Requested the Department of Transportation and Communications to grant subsidy for illumination of intersections on county roads meeting 80 per cent of the warrants for traffic signals.

—Requested the DTC to grant subsidy to counties for new sidewalks constructed in urban areas on county roads.

—Requested the DTC to review policies and suggested expenditures on approved signals be recognized for subsidy, and asked for a clarification of the requirements for traffic control on county roads.

The Minister told this newspaper they had considered using the proposed Parkway Belt for the transmission line between the Nanticoke and Pickering generating stations. However, he said the accumulated affect of technical problems related to underground transmission in the vicinity of the airport made it both impractical and uneconomical. McKeough did say, however, there had been a great change in Ontario Hydro's thinking on the route of the line and they had developed new types of towers that blended with the landscape, which he indicated would sit better with land owners than the original proposals.

The Parkway Belt system, is being planned in an east-west direction between the lower and upper tiers centres and in a north-south direction to preserve
