

Community growing — new families

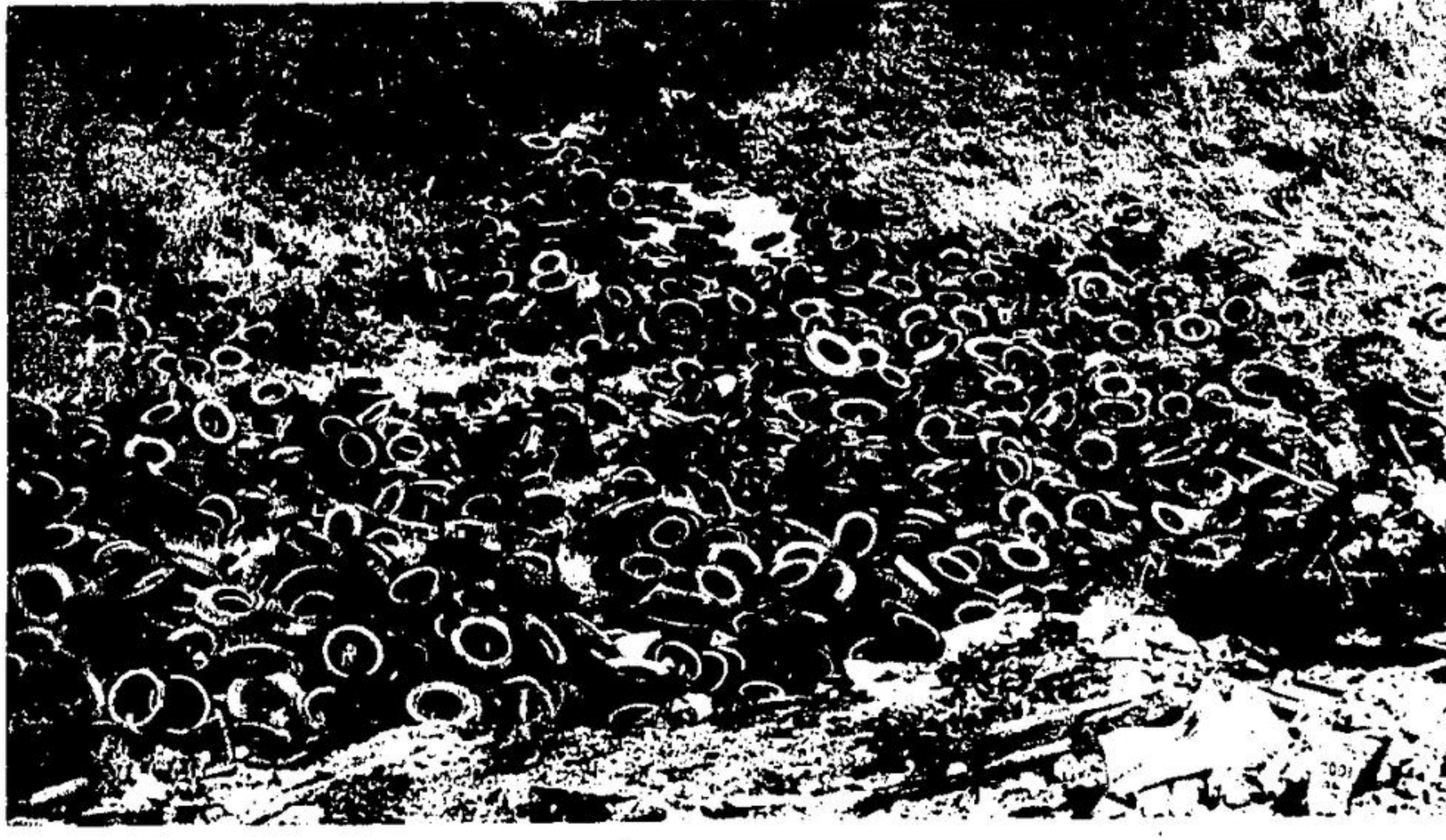

Mrs. G. Currie's death shock to many friends

The sudden death of Mrs. George Currie, wife of a former Esquesing reeve and county warden, at her home in Stewarttown August 4, was a shock to her many friends.
A gifted and talented pianist, she was well known across the county and through much of southern Ontario as the leader of the Doris Hulls Orchestra which was one of the popular dance bands of the area. She led the orchestra for 22 years.
Mrs. George Currie's proficiency at the piano made her orchestra one of the most sought after in the district for dances and other types of engagements and her death closed a chapter on some very pleasant memories for those she entertained.
Mrs. Currie was also very much involved in public life as the wife of George Currie, former reeve of Esquesing and Warden of Halton in 1969. One of the final public functions she attended was the presentation of the township's official plan at Stewarttown school.

Born in England
The former Doris Cash, she was the daughter of George Edward and Elizabeth Layfield Cash. Born at Manchester, England, the family moved to Mayfield and then to Stewarttown. Her first husband, William Hulls, died in 1967, and she married George Currie in 1969.
She leaves her husband, a sister Mrs. John Storey of Orangeville, and a brother Ron Cash of Stewarttown. A sister Elsie and brother Fred predeceased her.

She was a member of St. John's Anglican Church, Stewarttown. The funeral service was conducted by her minister, Canon J. E. Maxwell at the McClure Funeral Home, Georgetown. Interment was in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown.

No kindergarten for Norval school

Norval School will operate this year but without a kindergarten, Halton County Board of Education decided at their meeting last week.
Julian Reed and a band of Norval residents pleaded successfully with the board to have the school left open and pushed unsuccessfully for a kindergarten at the school. The school has never had a kindergarten.
Although Reed says there are more, board officials are able to verify the existence of only 12 kindergarten children in or near the hamlet.
Emmerson Lavender, assistant to the director of education said no child would have to travel more than 12 miles or be on a bus longer than 40 minutes. Mr. Reed had earlier told the board children spend up to two hours and 45 minutes riding the buses.
In his recommendation to the board Mr. Lavender noted 12 persons were not sufficient to justify a kindergarten. He said the suggestion to set up a kinder-

garten in a church basement wasn't taken seriously.
Various arrangements were considered but none had enough merit to justify the move. He noted there were three other schools in the county without kindergartens and if Norval had one the others would have to as well. Norval kindergarten students will continue to travel to Pineview School for kindergarten.

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
