### No change Speed limit Transferred to Guelph General Hospital suffering from a sore

So far as Esquesing council is concerned the speed limit on No. 7 highway to the western entrance to Georgetown will remain as it is unless the Department of Transport requests a change.

Council received a letter from the town of Georgetown's solicitors noting the town had a survey made on the strlp of highway between Main St. N. and the western town limits but later found out all but two or three feet. of the road was in the township.

It was suggested, that Esquesing might be interested in enforcing the recommendations the town received from the Department of Transport which included a 35 mile per hour limit on that stretch of road.

Councillors generally were misympathetic to the suggestion with the deputy-reeve remarking that it took long enough to travel through Georgetown now without prolonging the trip. Speed limit is now 50 m.p.h, but it will soon change to 60 m.b.h.
