Answer: You get dizzy too. First make sure you're not hurting the horse in mounting. Many people dig the horse behind the elbow with their toe. Point your toe downward while actually mounting. Also, be sure the saddle isn't alipping around. If it is, use a mounting block for extra spring or lower the stirrup. If all is well in that direction, you must school him. Take a crop. dressage whip or willow switch and hold it in your right hand. Arrange reins snugly in left hand to check forward movement. Place right hand over croup using the whip on the horse's off side to check the tendency to swing out, mount lightly and quickly. Praise him, dismount
