

Bill Taylor first winner Brunelle Memorial Trophy shop

Don't want shop

The man, who in the words of tournament chairman Gil Malcolm "conceived the idea of the 'Masters' and worked hard to bring its fruition", Sam Brunelle was honored posthumously Saturday at the trophy presentation ceremony, which followed the annual Legion "Masters" golf tournament.

Bill Taylor became the first recipient of the Sam Brunelle Memorial Trophy, after he carded the low net score in the event, 67 (88-19). Legion sports chairman Bill Nicolak presented the trophy on behalf of Branch 197.

An avid golfer and respected member of the branch, Mr. Brunelle passed away suddenly in July.

Tindall tops

Jack Tindall shot a sizzling 75 (38-37), to win the Superior Glove trophy for low gross. Tindall's score was six strokes better than Julian Zajac, who carded off the Custom Cleaners award for second low gross.

Andy Nolan's 85 was the third best gross score of the day, while Don Grein came in with a 68 (88-20), to win second low net honors. Also breaking 90 in gross score were John Krapek 86, Nick Farion 89, Don Black 89 and Harry Moon 89.

Sports chairman Nicolak matched Grein's score exactly

and earned himself a new trophy for the top golfer over 50 years old. He also teamed up with Harry Moon, Herb Dodds and Ivan Kilby in the tourney's top foursome.

Branch vice-president Gord James topped all novices (scores of 125 or over) and Barry Inasco proved to be the top left-hander.

Root turns sod

Wellington-Dufferin MPP John Root turned the first sod Friday, to mark the start of construction of a second nine holes at Erin Heights Golf and Country Club.

Representatives of Colossus Development Corporation Ltd. of Georgetown, who purchased the former Hilltop Lodge Golf and Country Club in mid-June, guests and the new Erin Heights club pro Bill Richardson were also on hand for the sod turning ceremony on the fairway of the present sixth hole.

New direction

In the proposed new layout for the course, the existing nine holes will take on new direction, as they are integrated into the overall scheme for 18. Total yardage will be 6655 and par will be 72. Included in the 18 holes will be four par 5's, 10 par 4's and four par 3's.

A driving range and practice tee will be located near the tenth tee and a small lake will be constructed near the fifth green.

Add facilities

The clubhouse is to be redesigned internally to include a pro shop, dining area and possible lounge and beer garden. The motel units will remain in their present place and will still be used as hospitality rooms for tournaments and as private areas for special events.

Let's talk about horses

Question: I have a registered Quarter Horse that has been well-trained. However I am now having trouble mounting him. He spins away from me when I put my foot in the stirrup. He's alright if I have someone to hold him but I usually ride alone. What should I do? I'm tired of hopping around in circles on one leg.

Answer: You get dizzy too. First make sure you're not hurting the horse in mounting. Many people dig the horse behind the elbow with their toe. Point your toe downward while actually mounting. Also, be sure the saddle isn't slipping around. If it is, use a mounting block for extra spring or lower the stirrup. If all is well in that direction, you must school him. Take a crop, dressage whip or willow switch and hold it in your right hand. Arrange reins snugly in left hand to check forward movement. Place right hand over croup using the whip on the horse's off side to check the tendency to swing out, mount lightly and quickly. Praise him, dismount and repeat. Persevere till successful.

QUESTION: What are the little scab-like marks on the inside of each horse's leg?

ANSWER: These are called chestnuts and should be peeled

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
