Refreshing green grapes at your market suggest delightful eating. Remember that grapes offer low calorie sweetness with only 102 calories in a cupful. Of course, green grapes are great to enjoy out of hand but how about a really unusual recipe using grapes?

**Fresh Grape Pie**  
Unbaked pastry for 2-crust, 9-inch pie  
3 cups (1 lb.) grapes  
2½ cups thinly sliced green tomatoes  
1 cup sugar  
3 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca  
½ teaspoon salt  
1 tsp. ground allspice  
1 teaspoon grated lemon peel  
2 tablespoons butter or margarine  
Line a 9-inch pie plate with half of pastry, rolled 1/8-inch thick. Arrange grapes and tomatoes in alternating layers. If grapes are large, cut in half. Combine sugar, tapioca, salt, allspice and lemon
