Plan no changes at M.Z.B. school

In Acton, 1650 students head back to schools Tuesday. In addition, more Acton young people than ever before go out of town by bus for special courses offered elsewhere in the county.

The two public schools have just one new teacher each but there are nine newcomers at the high school.

Everywhere, everything is in readiness for Tuesday's big change in life style - from summer leisure to school's disciplines.

The high school teachers go back with the same salary as last year, their salary negotiations with the board of education still underway.

Enrolment in the Robert Little school is expected to be down this year somewhat, as slightly fewer children live in the centre of town. Principal G. W. McKenzie is presently in Guelph General Hospital for tests, but vice-principal Mrs. Mary Judd is at the school preparing everything for the opening.

Several changes were made at the school last year, and since all proved successful there are no changes planned for this term. Some painting and repairs were done during the summer.

There are no changes in borders, and Mrs. Judd expects to have just short of 600 in the classrooms Tuesday.

There is only one new teacher at the school—Richard Overholt of Niagara Falls who is starting his teaching career. He'll have a grade five class.

Two of the teachers got married during the summer; Miss Barbara McEachern is now Mrs. Holmes and Miss Sandra Wilson is now Mrs. Andrews. Mrs. Andrews teaches grade 4, Mrs. Holmes grade 6.

Inaugurate semesters four subjects each term

The new semester begins at the high school next Tuesday and principal Dave Katz is looking forward to it eagerly. "It will be challenging and very good for the students," he says, "and I anticipate very few problems."

Each student takes four one-hour subjects each semester, with the school year divided into two semesters. Few schools have tried these longer classes.

Mr. Katz says everything is ready to begin the first day. Timetables, being printed out by computer, were expected any day at the school and will be in the mail before school starts if possible.

A book store will be set up temporarily in the main corridor. Students will welcome expanded service in the cafeteria, which will make food available more hours each day, from 9.30 a.m. to 3 p.m. Beaver Foods will have chocolate, doughnuts and soup available for snacks as well as sandwiches, hamburgers, etc. for meals.

There are quite a few changes

in the school, with more to come when the resource centre is the fall. Equipment has been updated in the home ec. room and five pieces of have been added to the shop. There's a new allotment of audio-visual aids. The environmental science room has been partitioned to include an outside storage area and darkroom for the camera club. Room 9 will be an auxiliary cafeteria and quiet study area.

"The involvement of the student during the day is the key issue," Mr. Katz says. "The school can only reflect what the student puts into it." He is looking with anticipation at the unscheduled hour in the day, when students may participate in a variety of possibilities - quiet study, practice, or the assistance program in other schools, the library, office or cafeteria.

Enrolment is expected to be about 500 over last year's 400.

There are nine new teachers on Mr. Katz' staff this year as well as a new secretary, Mrs. Joan Williamson.

Mrs. Margaret Tamblin, retired and had a baby boy during the summer; her husband Dr. Paul Tamblin joins the staff to teach science after attaining his Ph. D. degree at the University of Guelph.

The new maths head Brian Downs taught before in Burlington.

The new moderns head comes here from Georgetown, Mrs. Sandra Mae Fleming. New phys. ed. teacher Miss Jennifer Mills taught in Kapuskasing but her home is in Georgetown.

Mrs. Joan Mislner, the librarian, has been in Milton, Georgetown and Waterdown schools.

Mrs. Ruth McCarroll joins the commercial staff; she taught at Clarkson before.

Brochure lists night schools

A brochure for Adult Education (Night School) classes sponsored by the Halton County Board of Education will be mailed to every home in the community during the first week in September.

Some 22 general interest courses are being offered at Acton District High School and one course (upholstery) at the Y.M.C.A. Building.

Several new courses, in addition to the ones that ran last year, are being offered.

Boris Shean, the Adult Education supervisor for the Acton District High School, has been active in developing new course offerings such as Conversational French, Flower Arranging, Gymnastics for men and women, Super 8 Film Making, Drama, various shop type subjects, and several handicraft courses.

Although most of the courses are two weeks in length, some courses, such as sewing and typing will run for twenty weeks. One course, the World Adventure Series, consists of five evening presentations viewing films and color slides of trips made by world travellers, some of whom are teachers at Acton District High School. Coffee will be served and it is hoped that entire families will take advantage of the World Adventure Series. Similar nature series may be planned for future presentation.

Persons wishing credit courses in Academic, Business and Technical areas are referred to course offerings at Milton and Georgetown High Schools. If sufficient numbers from Acton become available, credit courses will be formed at Acton District High School.
