Puslinch objects to expansion of Glen Eden area

Milton September 16 will hear objections to proposed redevelopment plans for the Glen Eden Ski Area at the Kelso Conservation Area.

The hearing was called by the category. He said Puslinch Ontario Municipal Board after objections were raised by Puslinch Township Council. It asked to pay. will very likely mean the postponement of the development work until 1972.

Halton Conservation Authority, which assumed control of the ski area in 1965, has proposed borrowing the \$92,500 required for the development work. The Authority planned to repay the loan within five years with the increased revenue from the ski

operation.

At their regular meeting, Tuesday, August 31, Acton

-Included in the minutes of the August 25 meeting of public works and utilities committee was a report that members feel the condition of Churchill Road North is improving with cuts in the road being impacted by traffic. Resurfacing of the road was recently completed, but Reeve Frank Oakes questioned whether the job had been done properly at a subsequent meeting.

-The committee also learned that in all probability municipalities will be required to spray to keep weeds killed in 1972. This was part of the county weed inspector's report.

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
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County snowmobile ban okay with Acton Council

Following a request for comments from the Halton county engineer, Acton Council raised no objections to a proposed county by-law which will ban the use of snowmobiles on all county roads.

Council passed a resolution saying they have no objection to the content of the county by-law, after a brief discussion at their regular meeting Tuesday, August

Reeve Frank Oakes, who doubles as Halton County Warden, explained county roads pass through municipalities and county council wanted to make sure any by-law they passed would not conflict with by-laws in other municipalities. Acton has no county roads.

Lots of owners

"Acton may not have county roads, but is certainly has lots of snowmobilers. Will there be some time that we can discuss this?", Councillor Norm Elllott asked.

Reeve Oakes felt the matter should go to a committee of council for a recommendation.

"We could be opposed to the extent county council take it, or they might not be taking it far enough," Councillor Peter Marks remarked.

Explaining the by-law in simple terms, Reeve Oakes told council, "It means if you want to take your vehicle from point A to B on any county road, you take it on a trailer."

"Gee it sounds pretty strict," Marks offered. "I think you would have to identify county roads at night properly," he

Although he said county council had not asked for comments from snowmobile clubs, the reeve made it clear the proposed bylaw had not been drafted because of objections from county council

members alone. Councillor Marks made one final suggestion that there should be exceptions for emergency vehicles.

"They're being used for emergency sometimes," he said. The proposed by-law will not apply to roads under jurisdiction
