Farm manager John Anderson said they expect to produce 10,000 tons of mushroom compost a year from the huge \$10,000 machine, the first of its kind ever built in Canada. A new steel barn, hovering over 10,000 square feet of cement floor has been provided to house the machine and the ingredients which blend together to make compost.

Mr. Anderson listed horse manure, hay, shredded corn cobs, brewers' grain, gypsum, potash and ammonium nitrate as the blend which makes the mushrooms grow. He expects most of the Halton growers will take advantage of the custom made compost.

Line in Burlington. That event is UN tour slated for Nov. 6. The International Plowing Match will be held in Haldimand County Oct. 12 Georgetown, recently


