Every area of Acton park will be filled this weekend with competitions, exhibits and displays of interest for the annual fall fair of Acton Agricultural Society. More spectator events than ever before are planned along with entertainment, contests, commercial booths and the gaudy midway all running simultaneously.

The fair will be officially opened by Halton's federal M.P. Rud Whiting. Provincial member, Minister of the Environment George Kerr also expects to be here.

The opening words are spoken at the Friday evening program.

Friday performance

Acton Citizens' Band starts off the evening's performance, parading through town at 7 p.m. and then playing a concert in the arena - their first since winning second place at the C.N.E.

They'll play until the program is ready to start and then an impressive line-up of stars

-- local and Toronto-based, will appear. The local stors are the contestants in the Miss Acton Fair contest, and the winner will be named at the end of the program. The city swingers are the professional entertainers, band, ventriloquist and trampoline artists.

Fair secretary-treasurer Mrs. Irene Swackhamer says all the commercial exhibits space has been sold, with some booked in a year ago. Requests for space have had to be turned down.

The school exhibits were judged last night (Tuesday) and make an interesting display. Work bees have been going on at the arena all week, preparing for the exhibits.

Big Saturday show On Saturday the parade forms up at the CN station at 12 noon, moving off as soon as

possible. Three bands are involved - the Acton band, the champion Opti-Knights Drum and Bugle corps of Guelph and the Georgetown Girls' Pipe Band.

Floats for judging are being prepared this week. Children's entries join the parade at Knox church.

Livestock and horse show judging begins at 11 a.m. Saturday to get in all the classes. The baby show has been completely divided into two to speed it up. There are two

Mrs. Swackhamer points out there are more new exhibitors with fewer entries this year, which should make for better competitions not dominated by a few names. Dances end the day.


