### Scotch Block dam opens

The \$1,258,000 Scotch Block dam and reservoir on Highway 25 north of Milton will be officially opened tomorrow (Thursday) by Halton West MPP and Minister of the Environment George Kerr. Halton Region Conservation Authority's main construction project of 1970-71, the dam and reservoir will be officially opened by the minister, with numerous other members of parliament and municipal representatives present, at 2 p.m.

HRCA chairman Barry Humphreys will welcome guests to the dam site. Those attending the ceremonies will be bussed to Scotch Block, from Milton fair grounds at 1:30 p.m. Among expected guests are Halton-Wentworth MP Jim Morrison, Halton East MPP and Minister Without Portfolio Jim Snow.

### ESQUESING Township Council HIGHLIGHTS

At the regular meeting Monday night, Esquensing Council:

—Received a request from the Halton Region Conservation Authority to forward their 1971 levy in the amount of \$9,223.36. The letter explained the Authority is presently financing by bank loan to carry on operations.

—Approved plans presented by the Department of Transport and Communication concerning realignment of Highway 7 at Norval and replacement of the Credit River bridge there, subject to the conditions that a seven foot sidewalk be installed on each side of the bridge and signal lights be installed at the corner of Highway 7 and Adamson Street.

—Opened tenders for replacement of the Credit River bridge at Norval. Tenders received and prices were Roger F. McEachern Ltd., Mount Forest \$84,108; Inverlee Construction, Milton \$84,904.90; and Armstrong Brothers Co. Ltd. \$90,387. Engineering consultant Don Tefft is to study the tenders further, before making a recommendation. The new bridge is to be open to traffic by December 15.

—Granted permission to the County of Halton to construct a storage garage on the Fourth Line north of Milton.

—Decided to have building inspector Tom McLean watch closely a new barn on the property of Mrs. St. Jean, Lot 15, Con. 6, to make sure it is being used for none other than agricultural purposes, in accordance with the township's agricultural holding by-law. In a letter to Mrs. St. Jean, township solicitor Terrence Baines said it had been discovered two three piece washrooms had been installed in the barn without permits and that the sewage disposal system had been installed without approval. The letter warned the township would take action if it were found the building was being used for purposes other than agriculture.

Councillor Len Cox chaired the meeting, since both Reeve Tom Hill and Deputy-reeve Russell Miller were absent. Reeve Hill was away in Windsor on county business, while the deputy-reeve was called away unexpectedly earlier in the day. He arrived later in the meeting.

### Nassagaweya Council Briefs

At the regular meeting of Nassagaweya Council Sept. 7 council:

—Learned Doug McLaren, Department of Agriculture representative, had toured Halton and recommended all towns and townships spray weeds in 1972.

—Agreed individuals wishing to withdraw applications for amendments to the official plan must do so three weeks before the date set for a committee of adjustment hearing, if they wish to receive their \$50 rebate.

—Accepted an invitation on behalf of the township staff to attend a seminar held by the Halton County Clerk's Association at Mohawk Inn Oct. 13 to discuss inter-municipal co-operation.

—Heard reports of complaints from two Campbellville persons objecting to the forcefulness of the regional assessment officers. According to the complaints the assessors were asked to return to the homes after the husbands of the families returned, and refused entering the home against the wish of the housewife.

—Received a second subsidy from the Department of Transport and Communications for road work. The minister indicated the second subsidy would increase cash flow to the municipality and reduce short term borrowing.

—Accepted a suggestion from Deputy Reeve Don McMillan that consideration be given to a celebration in honor of the township hall's 100th birthday and the township's 125th birthday in 1974.

—Learned the Department of Transport and Communications would permit township roads less than 66 feet wide subject to OMB approval. A road at the Guelph
