Nassagaweya Township will attempt to collect over \$30,000 they believe is owing to them from the Ontario Department of Education.  
Nassagaweya Township Council met with officials from the Halton County Board of Education and the Department of Education in an attempt to correct what they feel is their unfair share of the education tax.  
Recently the council received a letter from Minister of Education Robert Welch, The letter simply conveyed the concern of the government but noted the case had been reviewed but no offer of assistance was hinted at.  
When Nassagaweya council worked out the figures the Department used they concluded the Department owed the township in excess of \$30,000.
