When I first started baking stuff to enter in the Acton Fair, one of the "Fair Ladies" gave me advice on this and that. One suggestion was that I make note of the things I'd like to enter, then make them once a month or so, all year 'round, till I perfected technique flavor and so on.

That sounded quite logical, but it just doesn't seem to work, as far as whomping up all sorts of red-ribbon concoctions. This year, the things I make fairly regularly and am quite pleased with (like peanut butter cookies, chocolate chip cookies, pumpkin pie, and apple pie) didn't place at all.

But things I baked for the first time did quite well!

What I found rather amusing, was my Cherry Loaf being placed first. To begin with, I couldn't find a recipe for one, so just threw nut loaf ingredients together, substituting all kinds of things. I baked one loaf for the fair and a small one to sample here. It was in such sad shape that I almost fed the large loaf to the dogs, but then thought that that was setting a bad example for the kids and their baking, and entered it anyhow. And won! Really though, when I brought it home and passed it out around, it wasn't as bad as I'd thought. But I still can't figure what I put in it!

Here's two of the other prize-winning recipes, though.

ORANGE-DATE NUT LOAF—2nd
Pour 1/2 cup boiling water and 1/2 cup orange juice over 1 cup chopped dates. Add 1 1/2 tsp. grated orange rind. Cool.
Beat 1 egg, 1/2 cup brown sugar, 1 tsp salt, 1/2 tsp vanilla, 1/4 cup corn oil. Combine with date mixture.

Sift 1 1/2 cups flour, 1/4 cup corn starch, 1 tsp baking soda, 1 tsp baking powder, (and 1/4 cup nuts, if you like). Add to date mixture and beat till combined, about 1 minute.

Pour into an oiled loaf pan, bake at 325 degrees for 55 to 60 minutes.

RAISIN PIE—3rd
Cut rind from an orange and dice half of it very finely. Cut half of pulp in small pieces and eat the rest while you continue. (Save other half of rind for something else)

Simmer rind, 2 1/4 cups raisins, 2 1/2 cups boiling water, covered, for 10 minutes. Mix 1/4 cup sugar, 1/2 tsp. nutmeg, 3 tsp flour, 1/4 tsp salt. Add a bit of raisin mixture and mix till smooth, then add to rest of raisins. Cook and stir till thick. Add cut orange pulp.

Pour into unbaked pie shell, cover with fancy crust and bake at 425 degrees for 30 to 35 minutes.

This may also be cooled and used in a baked pie crust with meringue topping.
