

R. 5 Rockwood, deserves great credit for her handling of the younger girls. Almost 26 kids were consistently in the running to participate in the "under 12" girls' Tri-County games and it was the popularity of the coach which kept them there.

The accident occurred on the 4th Concession, just west of Highway 24 near Rockwood at approximately 5.52 p.m. and Professor Constas was taken to the Guelph General Hospital by ambulance but pronounced dead shortly after arrival. Dr. Helen Constas, B. Sc.,

M.A., Ph.D., was a professor of Sociology at the University of Guelph. She was the only person in the car at the time of the accident and there were not witnesses. Constable J. Lennox of the Guelph detachment of the OPP is continuing investigation.


