Build own arena in Esquesing—Reeve Hill

Esquesing reeve Tom Hill urged Esquesing township council to seriously consider building an arena in a central site in the township and operate their own minor hockey program.

Noting that Georgetown Branch 120 of the Legion has withdrawn their sponsorship of minor hockey in Georgetown, Hill said this would seriously affect the chance of many township boys to participate in a minor

hockey program. He felt the answer was in the township building their own arena in some central place and running their

own hockey program.
Hill said the size and the assessment of the township made an arena feasible at this time and council should be looking for some cheap property on which to start building.

Not elaborate He didn't envision an elaborate

arena but an edifice seating 500 to 1,000 people, sufficient to meet the needs of the township. He saw minor hockey dying in Georgetown and costs escalating to the point where it would be im-practical for the township to

participate in their program.
"Let's float debentures and do
it," he urged an astonished

"What's it going to cost?" asked Councillor Wilfrid Leslie.

Hill admitted he had no idea but felt the township was big enough to look after their own needs now without relying on Georgetown to supply recreation.

"It will be worthwhile to explore the proposal and find out the different aspects," thought Councillor Len Coxe.

Although councillors noted there was no trouble with Acton or Milton regarding minor hockey programs, opinion was that the Georgetown dilemma was not going to be easily solved and many minor hockey players would be without a place to play. Drop "Kid" hockey

Hill's dismay at the situation in Georgetown stemmed from the action of Georgetown Legion in dropping "kid" hockey in Georgetown because of a disagreement with the Parks and Recreation committee over costs.

The recreation committee has guaranteed that minor hockey will continue in Georgetown under their sponsorship regardless of the outcome of the squabble with the Legion, but Reeve Hill is not convinced.

A Legion delegation walked out of a council meeting the previous week when the matter was discussed in front of Georgetown council. The parks and recreation committee had figures to show that the town paid \$3,823 or 63 per cent of minor hockey costs in 1970-71 and has argued they would pay \$4,466 or 65.1 per cent if there were no increases. The Legion delegation walked out charging they had no way of knowing whether the figures were accurate.

The Legion has operated "kid" hockey in Georgetown for 20

Dent, with a grin. Mr. Dent told council he would raise only three or four dogs, not wall-to-wall pupples.

Cobblehill Road gets facelifting

Acton Council authorized work to start on the construction of

sidewalks and a storm sewer ditch on Cobblehill Road, as well as installation of a number of street lights for Cobblehill Road Victoria St. and Willow Street at a meeting Tuesday.

> Council accepted the tender of Milton Paving and Construction Ltd. in the amount of \$9,341.50 for construction of the sidewalk and ditch. Sidewalks are to be five feet wide and constructed of concrete. The ditch is to be covered with a two inch layer of asphult, after excavations and installations are completed.

> > Install lights

A total of 17 luminaires will be said. installed on Cobblehill Road. Victoria Street will have eight installed and Willow Street one. Total cost of the lighting is \$2,842.95.

Referring to Cobblehill Road, Deputy-Reeve Garnet McKenzie commented, "This is a case of doing one area properly, instead of hitting three or four piecemeal. It's the time to do it, when the sidewalk's going in."

Propose \$70,000 homes in Speyside estates

Plans for an exclusive estate development on the former Olen property on 25 Highway, near Speyside, were unveiled by Messrs. Boyd and Fitzpatrick of Cameron Heights Development Ltd. to Esquesing Council, Monday night. Fifteen \$70,000 homes are planned for the property, on the bend at Speyside.

Smallest acreage of the proposed development would be slightly under two acres with five per cent of the 43.55 acres donated for parks. It would be known as Twillingate Estates.

The area is heavily wooded with maples and beech trees and

plans fall in line with Esquesing's Official Plan which proposes estate development with minimum floor space of houses 1,800 square feet and two acres of

Councillors were impressed with the presentation and indicated they would recommend planning board when the Official Plan was approved. "It would not be fair to designate it for estate development at this time." said Councillor Dick Howitt.

Homes worth \$70,000

Mr. Boyd, an official of Headway Corporation, told council the developer would control the whole subdivision, building quality homes worth about \$70,000. He indicated they would like to start building in the spring if possible.

Reeve Hill told the two men the township's Official Plan had been to the Minister and he had asked for some changes but it would be impossible to say when final approval would be received. He promised the developers of council's co-operation when the Official Plan was approved.

Councillor Howitt also advised the delegation that the proposed development could conflict with plans by Consolidated Sand and Gravel to open a quarry on an adjacent 600 acre site.

Surprised Both men expressed surprise at the information. They agreed it could seriously affect their plans if the quarry was blasting and

extracting rock nearby. Earlier in the meeting council heard a letter from the Department of Mines and Northern Affairs asking if there were any objections to issuing a permit to Consolidated to open their proposed quarry at Speyside. Council felt the letter should be forwarded to the planning board first.

"It is nice to see the Department following our wishes for once instead of issuring the permit and then telling us about it," remarked Councillor Howitt.
