Bobby Anderson dies after long illness

Acton lost one of its most Rumley-Shoemaker funeral colorful sports figures when home Saturday with Rev. H. Robert (Bobby) Anderson succumbed to a lengthy illness at Toronto General Hospital last Thursday, September 23, in his 62nd year.

A well known resident of Cameron St., Bobby Anderson enjoyed life as few do, with a waggish sense of humor that kept sports fans and fellow workers at Beardmore and Co. chortling for

One of 13 children of Emerson Anderson and Matilda Bonus he early developed a keen interest in sports which led him into hockey as a junior at 14 years of age. He became one of the best baseball catchers in the county, and coming out of retirement to help baseball championships in the late 1940's.


Pitchers in the strong Halton County Baseball League shuddered when Bobby Anderson stepped up to the plate, knowing he could really belt a ball but fearful also of the quip which might reduce them to laughter. He was very fond of hockey and played junior and intermediate in an Acton uniform, keeping his hand in as a coach when his playing days were done.

Bob Anderson worked at Beardmore and Co. most of his life except for over three years he spent in the Canadian army during World War II, much of it in British Columbia. He was a school caretaker for a short time, ume, but returned to Beardmore and Co. until failing health forced his retirement in 1970.

He kept his interest in sports by attending games and enjoyed reminiscing about the golden days of baseball and hockey in Acton. He was also well known as the plumbing partner of neighbor Colin MacColl. Many plumbing systems were installed expertly with good humor and neighborliness that earned him a host of friends.
