Let's talk about horses

Q: Last week I was riding a rented horse with some friends when a dog barked and scared my horse. He swung round and bolted for the stable about two miles away. I pulled and pulled but could not stop him. Fortunately I was not hurt but very frightened. Is there any way to stop this from happening again?

A: You cannot always prevent a horse from bolting but it helps to have a safety device on hand. First, the minute you feel him bunch his muscles and wheel around, take a firm hold of his mouth and speak to him gently but firmly. If he still takes off at a gallop, concentrate on pulling one rein to induce the horse to circle. If necessary, get a rein under your foot for extra leverage. A horse can't bolt when he's being pulled around in a circle. However, the ground may not be safe for this, so try sawing hard on his mouth. Pull one rein down and the other up, brace one hand on the withers and yank with the other, drop the

you. Go at least two hours before the sale begins. Your horse friend will help you pick out three or four sound prospects. Ask all the questions you can. Try to get permission to ride them outside the barn. Above all, look at the head. If the eye is quiet and friendly, with a wide forehead and small widest ears, chances are the temperament is good. But remember, blame no-one but yourself if the horse you buy turns out to have some incurable problem.
