# Library board declines Erin grant

At their regular meeting, October 1, Erin Township Council:

- Agreed to pay \$227 in extra costs for the building of the new Fire Hall. On Sept. 20, they had accepted the tender of Bob Reynolds, Georgetown, for \$23,380.
- Decided to take legal action against a resident who had not complied with the trailer by-law in getting a licence.
- Directed Clerk Elmer McKimmon to write a letter to the

School Board in support of a new high school large enough to support all the options. At present, Erin students are being transported to Hazelton for commercial options.

Received a letter from Frank Cowan Co. Ltd., stating that there is an increase in the amount of Firemen's Workmen's Compensation available. Council voted to pay the extra fee of \$40 for the 20 men. Compensation will be increased from \$7,000 to \$9,000 per annum, or from \$100.00 to \$120.00 per week. Deputy-Reeve Donald Mathison commented that "This is a small way for us to

show our confidence in them." Received a tentative application from R. H. Harman for rezoning of his property in Orton, to permit a small plastics company to form and operate. The letter included 10 signatures of 10 neighbours showing no objection. Council will send a recommendation to Official Planner, Howard Smith.

Killed by dogs. Passed a motion to pay \$269 for six lumps and one newborn calf killed by dogs. One dog was shot.

Were pleasantly surprised to

learn that the Library Board has declined a township grant. Chairman of the library board, J. C. Parkinson explained that the grant was not needed, at present. He also suggested that screens be placed over the library windows, as there was a case of vandalism recently.

—Were visited by Blair Kennedy and Fred Cox on behalf of Minor Hockey. Mr. Kennedy explained that although the \$300 contributed by council in '70 covered last year's costs, they would like to obtain more ice-time this year, as youngsters were only getting about 10 minutes actual playing time,

each week. Council agreed to pay \$300, with possibly more forthcoming if needed.

## ESQUESING COUNCIL BRIEFS

At the regular meeting of Esquesing council Monday evening, members:

—Agreed to allow the Hamilton Art Gallery to sell lottery tickets within the township after the official Oct. 29 date. The funds from the lottery are to be used to expand art galleries in Ontario, members were told.

—Decided to refund a cheque for \$750 to Systems Construction Co. Ltd. on Fifth Line, Esquesing. The company had forwarded the cheque to council in payment of a building permit for further expansion of their present operation. The company has since dropped plans for any expansion of operations.

—Accepted the names of Tom Mullin of R.R. 1 Georgetown; Mrs. Donald Wilson and Bill Lawson, both of R.R. 5 Milton to be considered to sit on the library board of the township.

—Advised the clerk to inform Murray McKinlay that the permit for his trailer would be void, should he move it out of the township.

—Observed the change in date of the Halton Clerks and Treasurers Association meeting, now to be held at Mohawk Inn, Campbellville on Thursday, Oct. 14.

—Gave by-laws three readings to designate the Nassagaweya-Esquesing Town Line from the southern limit of Lot 17 to the northern limit of Lot 21 and the road between Lot 17 and 18 Esquesing from the west boundary of Highway 25 to the east boundary of the Nassagaweya-Esquesing Townline be declared as through highways. Council is still awaiting approval of the Department of Trans-

portation and Communications.

—Agreed to have the roads superintendent and his crew build a by-pass to be used by residents of the 10th Line to transport their youngsters to and from where they meet the school bus. The present bridge on this roadway is under construction and a deputation of seven

residents approached council for a solution to the problem, charging their youngsters had to wade the creek to meet the school buses. Council agreed to have a by-pass completed within two days.

—Approved the development of a sanitary land fill site at Indus-run Quarries in Esquesing Township at an estimated cost of \$2,150 to \$2,700. The cost includes preliminary site investigations, the development plan and disposal site operations to be completed by Philips Planning and Engineering Limited of Burlington.
