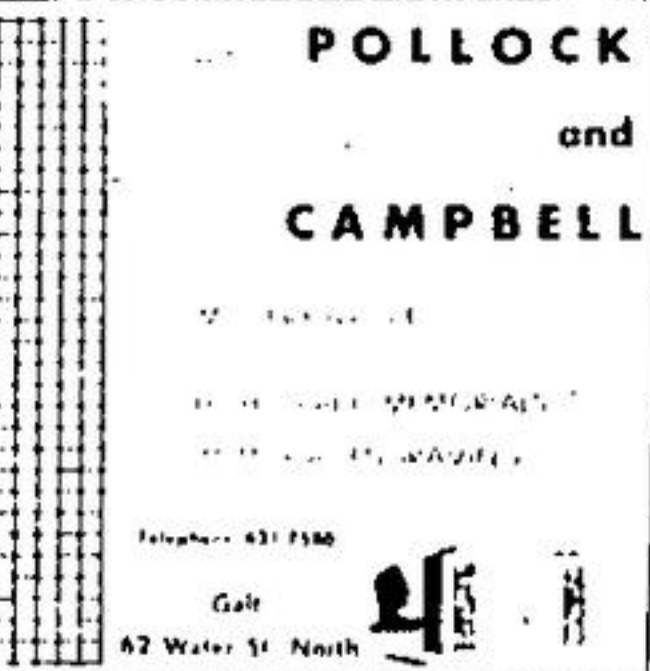
the new one-piece uniforms introduced this fall. Several mothers are planning to make their daughters' uniforms.
